AUSTRALIA DAY AWARDS 2023 AUSTRALIAN FIRE SERVICE MEDAL



GEORGE ROBERT GRANT

The Buzz is delighted and very honoured to report that one of our own local volunteers has been awarded the prestigious Australian Fire Service Medal by the Governor-General within the Australian Honours system on 26th January 2023.

Not only is this person a Shire of Gingin resident but has lived in the Neergabby area most of his life.

George Robert GRANT was born in November 1946 and was inspired by his father, the late Alf Grant, to fight bushfires when he was just 14 years old. This led him towards a lifetime of outstanding service to his local community, the Shire of Gingin and assisting throughout the State when necessary.

In 1963, George joined the Gingin West Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade, starting a 60-year volunteer career, battling blazes and mentoring others on how to protect their districts.

During his tenure at the Gingin West Brigade, George held many positions, including Captain, Lieutenant, Fire Control Officer and Deputy Bush Fire Control Officer, a role he relinquished in 2018 'to give the young ones a go'. So diligent and committed was he to the team, that he had a UHF service radio fitted to his private work vehicle, so he could carry out incident management operations while out on his job drilling water bores.

This strategy was particularly valuable when in 2015, the Shire of Gingin had two Level 2 incidents running simultaneously and he was not only a responder, but a ground controller too. He has also fought blazes outside the district, including 12-hour shifts battling the devastating 2021 Wooroloo fire.

In June 1987, George was presented with a Commendation for Brave Conduct, for rendering assistance to another volunteer firefighter whose life was in danger, which highlighted his high regard for safety of self and others during emergency incidents.

George has been an outstanding leader in his community through his dedication to service and care of others in his volunteer roles. His guidance has ensured the next generation of volunteer bush firefighters is well prepared for the task and they have appropriate vehicles and equipment to keep them safe while they protect life and property.

On behalf of all the Shire of Gingin residents, the Buzz would like to convey heartfelt congratulations to George on his well-deserved award. George will be officially presented with his Medal at a ceremony at Government House in April.

When next you see George, please join us in expressing our thanks and sincere gratitude to him for his exemplary and dedicated commitment – a mammoth effort over 60 years, helping to protect life and property. Well done!

The Buzz would like to take this opportunity of mentioning that the late Maxwell John Borwick was also awarded the Australian Fire Service Medal on 26 January 2001 – proving that the Shire of Gingin has an extremely high calibre of fire fighters and that volunteering in the Shire of Gingin is very worthwhile and does not go un-noticed by those who matter.

Proposed change of focus for Gingin Water Group

Over the years between 2010 and 2020 David Rickson, the first Chair of the Gingin Water Group, worked hard and collaborated with the Department of Water to gain an understanding of how the local aquifers work. This provided information about the source of the water which feeds the perennial streams and associated freshwater lakes in the Gingin area. This culminated in the Gingin Brook Water Catchment Community Engagement Project. The project was supported by funding from the Western Australian Government's State NRM Program and enabled the printing of a Landholder Water Information Package. The package was launched at a Community Water Forum in October 2020.

The booklet, together with information related to water and wetland management, was also distributed at a series of landholder field forums in 2021. At the field forums a number of landholders expressed an interest in undertaking on-ground projects to protect streams or wetlands on their properties.

With this in mind the Gingin Water Group is now pivoting its focus to promoting on-ground work. After undertaking a small amount of weed control and revegetation under the initial grant, Gingin Water Group is now looking to engage with landholders interested in undertaking onground work to protect streams or wetlands on their properties. Examples of the type of work which could be undertaken include weed control

and revegetation. Interested landholders should contact the Gingin Water Group by mid-February 2023 to discuss potential projects.

We share with most other community groups, the problem of getting people to contribute by becoming members of the committee. You only need to attend three meetings and an AGM each year. So, the group is seeking new members, particularly younger members to sit on the committee and make a difference. If we have no success in attracting new members then the group may need to go into recess for twelve months with the view to winding up the incorporated group. This would be a sad day for the one incorporated environmental group in the Greater Gingin area. If you feel you can contribute, please contact the Gingin Water Group or attend the AGM, to be held on the evening of 16th March 2023 at the Gingin Golf Club.

Membership of \$22 is now due for the calendar year 2023. 



Past Gingin News

It has been 45 years since the first edition of the Gingin Community News was published. It began as a Shire Council Publication and has now evolved to the current format The Gingin Buzz, produced by the Gingin Community Resource Centre monthly.

Looking back, to the second edition, published in March 1978 which is the first that is held

in the Gingin Shire Archives and the 'news' second edition, it was interesting to see that this was when the first Medical Centre was being planned and the original centre land was donated by a local family. Originally Dr Williams one of our first practicing doctors was housed in an old house in Brook Street Gingin.

From the March 1978 Edition:

"News Flash"

Gingin Townsite Lot 60 Robinson Street has been donated for the establishment of a Medical Centre

Mr. & Mrs. D. Barrett-Lennard have generously given this large and valuable block of land for medical associated facilities for the benefit of the near Gingin and surrounding areas.

Mr. Barrett-Lennard's great grandfather, Edward B Lennard, was the first person to be granted land in the Gingin District. This was a 5,000 acre block on Lennard's Brook and was granted in February 1851, twenty months after the foundation of the Swan River Colony. Owing to its isolated position and the fact that it was a favourite camping and hunting place of the aborigines, Mr. Barrett-Lennard found that his men would not stay there, and it was therefore impossible to found a station at Lennard's Brook, and on the Governor's permission to exchange this land for area on the Avon River near Beverley.

It remained for another of Doug's great grandfather W.L. Brockman, to found the first working farm at Gingin. This property was at first known as Gingin but was later named, Cheriton when the Gingin town was formed.

Doug and Olive themselves have been actively connected with land development and public matters in the Gingin district for the last twenty-seven years and their sons each own farms in the district. It would be appropriate if the Barrett-Lennard name was permanently associated with this piece of land.

This early edition was full of sporting news, Shire works and excerpts from books concerning our earliest pioneers. A copy of the early editions can be found in our library, and it is hoped that in future Buzz's we will have interesting articles from the late 70's through to the turn of the century so that we can reminisce our towns past.

Her role was running coaching clinics, mentoring young aspiring coaches and coordinating junior carnival/s for under 13 and under 15 age groups.

Over her hockey career, Janet has done a lot of behind the scenes work with organizing club masters' teams, supporting 'new' Masters Players, as well as anything that needs to be done to support Masters Hockey at a club level, and for Masters Hockey in Western Australia. She has been involved with coaching and has held various official positions.

Janet is WA's most respected and dedicated representative nominated to receive the Award In Recognition Of Outstanding Contribution To Women's Masters Hockey in Western Australia for 2021.

Glenys Edith Mcquillan 20 June 1938 – 2 December 2022

Formerly of Brandis Street, Gingin. Wife of Edwin (Eddie). Mother of five, grandmother and great grandmother.

Glenys lived in Brandis Street Gingin for approximately 15 years before moving to live with her daughter and son-in-law on the Australind Estuary area for last 12 months of her life.

Glenys lived in Meekatharra prior to moving to Gingin.

She had a close circle of friends in Gingin who enjoyed many outings together. Glenys was employed by the Shire of Gingin to assist with the folding and enveloping of Rate notices in the days when they were manually collated and posted.

James (Jim) Hammer 29 June 1928 - 3 December 2022

Formerly of Gingin, late of Rockingham/ Mandurah. Husband of Mary (dec), Father, grandfather and great grandfather.

Jim lived in Gingin for some 40 years and was an Inaugural Member of both the Gingin Golf Club and Gingin Bowling Club. In 1965 Jim won the Golf and Bowling Championships in the same year. He was made a Life Member of the Bowling Club.

Jim is well remembered in the outlying districts of Gingin for delivering both the mail and the weekly groceries on what was known as the Mail Run, whilst helping manage Lucrafts – now IGA Express – for many years.

Eva Meinen

5 December 1938 - 16 November 2022

Partner of Graham Hand for 34 years.

Eva was not well known in Gingin but lived quietly in Lefroy Street, having moved to the town from Two Rocks in 2003. In the latter years of her life, Eva was determined to remain in her home and she was supported by Graham and Silver Chain to achieve her wish. She passed away at home.

Born in Germany, Eva was a great cook and

helped in the support of well-known resident and identity, Marj Bandy, during the last years of her life. Eva enjoyed the beauty of Gingin, and in Graham's view, was a "Ray of Sunshine in a Dark World".

Daphne Thompson 28 May 1932 – 24 December 2022

Wife of Murray (dec), Mother, grandmother and great grandmother.

Daphne was a long term resident of Gingin, living firstly in Lefroy Street, Mooliabeenee Road and then Weld Street, before moving to Bunbury approximately 18 months ago to live with family. In recent months she was a resident of an Aged Care facility Yanchep.

Daphne took up golf with a passion later in life and was made a Life Member of the Gingin Golf Club in 2002. The flowering of the gerberas in her front garden were always cause for comment – and she would say "and they receive no attention at all"!!

Rodney Barry (Rod) Hannagan 19 November 1943 – 6 January 2023

Husband of Cathy, Father, Pop and Big Pop.

Rod courageously battled chronic ill health for many years with the devoted support of Cathy. He was a long time Clubman and supporter of the Gingin Football Club and was at one time the lessee of the Cafe which is now Cu@Park.

Other residents who lived in the broader Gingin Shire, contributed to the Community and who have passed away in recent weeks are:-

Felicity (Flick) Barnden-Brown, of Redfield Park, who died Joondalup Health Campus 22 December 2022 aged 71.

Long time partner of Tom, Sister, sister-in-law and Aunty.

Flick was a Registered Nurse and a much valued and long term member of the Guilderton and Districts Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade.

Walter Brenkman, formerly of Woodridge and a Founding Member of the West Gingin Fire Brigade and much valued volunteer for Community causes.

Walter and his wife Jan, a former Editor of

the Moore River News, moved to Nannup approximately 10 years ago.

John Phillip Green, Died 10 January 2023. Formerly of Chitna Road.

John carted cattle and turf farming in the district for many years and was a great horseman. He had an amazing collection old carts, horse drays and saddlery that he would make available for private viewings. Son, Jeremy, remains in the district as a Stock Agent for West Coast Stock. Deepest sympathy is extended to all families and friends on the loss of their loved ones.

Glenys, Jim, Eva, Daphne, Rod, Flick, Walter and John were valued contributors to our Community in their various ways over many years and we thank them for their service.



Dramatic increase in used motor vehicles complaints in WA

Consumer complaints for defective used motor vehicles in Western Australia (WA) skyrocketed over the last five years, increasing 730% and peaking in 2022.

With 777 complaints lodged to Consumer Protection in 2021 and 2022 compared to a total of 287 complaints in 2018 to 2020, the surge in demand for used vehicles was primarily due to long delivery delays on new vehicles during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Other contributing factors to the rise in complaints is believed to be flood-affected written-off vehicles from the eastern states being sold in WA, as well as a strong demand for used four wheel drive vehicles due to travel restrictions keeping families grounded in WA.

Many of the complaints over the last five years were for used vehicles that broke down within days of being purchased, some shortly after being driven out of the car yard.

This rise in demand for used vehicles in WA means some sellers may be enticed to off-load vehicles that may be defective.

Consumers should be vigilant when shopping around in this over-heated used vehicle market and make sure to get the vehicle inspected to check it is mechanically sound.

It is also recommended before purchasing, to check the used vehicle's history on the Personal Property Securities Register (PPSR) website to see if it has been written-off or has money still owing on it.

Specific warranties may not apply or may have expired on some used vehicles, however consumer guarantees under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL) may still apply.

Consumers should not take no for an answer when asking a seller for a refund, repair or replacement if defects are discovered.

Unfortunately private sales are not covered under the ACL, so buyers should be extra vigilant and do the same checks before making a purchase, as you could be out of pocket if something goes wrong.

The dramatic increase in complaints over the last two years in particular, has seen a total of \$6.1 million being successfully returned to consumers who lodged complaints with Consumer Protection.

The mozzie coil was burning quite low, and he was pretty sure he's been bitten a few times already. It didn't really bother him. He was used to it



Elevated Bacterial Warning for Moore River in Guilderton

The Shire of Gingin and the Department of Health are warning people to avoid swimming and other full-body water immersion activities in Moore River at Guilderton after recent sampling results detected amoeba and high bacteria levels at several sampling locations.

Secondary contact activities such as kayaking and boating are currently not impacted by this warning.

Elevated bacterial levels have the potential to increase the risk of people experiencing gastrointestinal, respiratory, and skin, ear, eye and throat illnesses and infections if people swim in or accidently ingest the water.

Anyone who has entered these waters and experiencing symptoms including nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, abdominal, chest pain etc, should seek medical attention and notify the Department of Health's Environmental Health Directorate on 9222 2000 (during office hours) or email: ehinfo@health.wa.gov.au.

Moore River is part of a broader agricultural catchment area and downstream river flow can bring nutrients, organic matter, sediments, and animal faeces and waste.

Amoeba warning signs are permanently displayed around the Moore River caravan park/river mouth area, and temporary health warning signs have also been erected.

The Shire of Gingin will continue to monitor microbial water quality and liaise with the Department of Health to advise when conditions have improved to levels suitable for swimming and other recreational water contact activities.

Another STEM group of activities were based around the theme of Fantastic Flying Things. Participants found out how to improve the flight of their hand made planes.


Quiver was part of the activities on offer for those that wanted to colour and make their picture come to life.

Has anyone else noticed that the play park equipment has been removed from the northern area of Granville Park? For what reason – was there a problem with these facilities or is it to focus peoples' attention on the Outdoor Activity Space and its facilities?

Contrary to what may have been thought, this quiet secluded area was a popular spot and used by many picnickers who enjoyed sitting on the grass under the shade as they watched their children play and/or used the free BBQ facilities.

The equipment was certainly favoured by Grandmas who would take their charges to play safely away from the busy roads.

Comment has been made about the dangerous design of the slide in the new Outdoor Activity Space area. It is unsafe for the age group it is designed for, 3-6 years olds. Should these children overbalance and fall, the first point of contact for their heads is on the rocky surrounds of the slide.

The BBQ's are certainly ideal for group gatherings – such as Birthdays, Christmas get- togethers and private functions, where it was difficult and impractical to share BBQ facilities. So it is good to see they have been retained.

Sadly the phrases "risk mitigation" and "duty of care" can be heard coming from the mouths of the Thought Police. A "Please Explain" would be nice.

Whilst on works' projects in the Park, another appears to be underway with closure of the walk path over the Scenic Pool weir. "Eye Spy" notes in previous Council Minutes, monies have been set aside for an upgrade which would also include access for mobility aids – that is gophers and walkers. As this footpath was bordering on the dangerous,

it would seem a good spend of ratepayers \$\$\$\$.

Interestingly in conversation about this project, "Eye Spy" was asked about Project Gingin (Inc) and where is it at?

For those who are unaware, a group of people got together under the banner of Project Gingin, following the success of the Outdoor Activity Space and the towns 150th Anniversary Celebrations, to look at projects that could enhance its liveability and reputation as a tourist town. The first formal meeting was in December 2021 and the Group set its sights on the upgrade of the Scenic Pool area and the replacement of the actual weir, inclusive of a fish ladder, to facilitate the migration of native fish upstream. (Yes there are freshwater fish in the Brook within the townsite).

Some 15 months has now passed and so the question "Where is the Group at" seems reasonable, given such projects have wide ramifications, inclusive of cost and "who pays"?

The "go to" person **is** Councillor Rob Kestel who was re-elected Chair of the Group at the their last AGM in December 2022. Also as Council had engaged an Engineering Consultancy to review the Scenic Pool for possible refurbishment in the last 12 – 18 months, he might also be able to give an insight on what Council itself has decided to do about this expert advice.

Editor: As it happens Councilor Kestel came into the Centre shortly after receiving this information and he informed us the community will see some visible changes on the scenic pool in February or March.

It is the peak of the summer holiday season and the layby adjacent to the Granville Park is lined with travellers and their mobile homes. They come to "spend a penny", maybe to have a picnic, stretch their legs, have a coffee in the nearby eatery, do a little shopping across the road, walk their dogs, enjoy the site and sound of the Water Wheel, **but** there is another reason and that is to empty their "household rubbish" in the Red Sulo bins that are located at the edge of the park.

At times the bins are full to overflowing, with additional bags of rubbish left lying at the base of these bins. On occasions, broken furniture and deck chairs, "kitchenalia" and of course the holiday special - flip flops/thongs -

are not uncommonly left behind.

The Town advertises itself as Caravanner friendly and a waste disposal site has been conveniently installed in the centre of the town with two Sulo bins for disposal of rubbish located nearby.

Maybe some more thought needs to be given to waste disposal and caravanners. The once held belief that by not providing rubbish bins people would take home their rubbish has long been proven a myth. It is more likely to be "Not wanted in my back yard – I will leave it in yours". The area is known as a Scenic Park – let it be kept this way. Guilderton Cafe Closing While New Operators Sought

The lessees of the Guilderton Café, Belgravia Leisure, have announced they will be closing the café on 31 January to coincide with the end of the school holidays. This decision has been made as a result of increasing operating costs which have made the existing business model for the café unsustainable.

Belgravia are now looking for new operators to take over the café.

As an interim measure, the Shire is investigating mobile food and coffee outlets to provide meal and drink options while new café operators are being sourced.

Rohan Gunton, Belgravia Leisure State Manager said: "We would like to thank all of those involved in the operation of the café and whilst we are sad to say goodbye, we are in discussions with a number of experienced and reputable cafe owners who have expressed interest in taking over the operation of Guilderton café".

Be skin aware this summer

Cancer Council WA is encouraging adults in the Wheatbelt region to familiarise themselves with the common symptoms of skin cancer, with the majority (55-70%) of melanomas detected by themselves or their partners.

It is important to know your skin and what is normal for you, particularly if you are over 40 years of age. Skin cancers (including melanoma) accounts for the largest number of cancers diagnosed in Australia each year. Our latest data reveals that in 2019, 1587 people in WA were diagnosed with melanoma and sadly 145 people died from it. In the Wheatbelt region in 2019, 58 people were diagnosed with melanoma and 5 died from it.

We know people living in regional Australia have lower rates of five-year survival, compared with people living in cities, so we urge anyone in the Wheatbelt experiencing a skin cancer symptom to visit their doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker.

Common symptoms of skin cancer include:

- A new spot or mole on your skin
- A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores
- Any spots, freckles or any moles changing in size (width), thickness (height), colour, or shape over a period of weeks to months.

It doesn't mean you've got skin cancer – often it turns out to be something less serious. But it is important to get checked. Getting our symptoms checked out and treated early means we can get back to the people we love and the things we love doing.
