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

Gingin Scout Group celebrates 40 years

Leaders, youth members, parents and the next generation reminiscenced as they looked through photo albums, Scout Group calendars and many A4 photos on the wall.

The group was started in 1982 by Gloria Hyne with 27 cubs and 5 leaders. Cubs has run continuously over the 40 years with as many as 38 cubs participating in the late 1990's through to the early 2000. With enthusiastic leaders over the years

Scouts, Venturers and Joeys have waxed and waned. The four Gingin Queen Scouts all attended the day.

There have been three homes for the scout group, the Old Golf Club building, the Pistol Club building and in 1996 they were given a shed at the Racecourse. With a \$10,000 Lottery West Grant and lots of busy bees. the shed was reclad, concrete flooring laid and a generator and pump added. In 2005 a Rotunda was added. It was under this Rotunda that the official presentations occurred for the 40th celebrations.

Typical fun scouting activities were set up outside - ballista's, slippery pole, land skis, sack races, an obstacle course with a climbing net and apple slinkies.. Many dads enjoyed challenging their children in these activities.

whatever, just sharing and caring.



Gingin Water Group Inc.

When the Gingin Water Group was formed in 2010 its main focus was on water availability into the future, particularly for smaller non-commercial water users and the environment. Over the years between 2010 and 2020 much work was done to gain an understanding of the local aquifers which are the source of the water for the perennial streams and associated freshwater lakes in the Gingin area. The effect of a drying climate on these aquifers, and hence the streams and wetlands, was also investigated.

A Landholder Water Information Package booklet was produced and forums held to disseminate this information to local landholders. The forums also gauged the interest of local landholders in undertaking on-ground projects to protect the remaining streams or wetlands on their properties. Landholders in the Lennard Brook and Moondah areas expressed an interest. With a small amount of funding which was available some weed control and revegetation was undertaken in these areas.

The Gingin Water Group would now like to see further work undertaken and is able to assist with advice, and assistance to apply for grants to help with some of the costs involved in the work. Interested landholders should contact the Gingin Water Group to discuss potential projects. If you think you might like to be involved but are uncertain and would like a landholder's perspective on the process, come to the Gingin Water Group's AGM. A local landholder who undertook a project to protect a wetland on his property many years ago will speak about his experience and what the outcome is today.

For the Gingin Water Group to be able to provide this assistance, it needs people to be members of the committee. As with most other community groups, there is a problem getting people to become members of the committee. You only need to attend three meetings and an AGM each year. The group is seeking new members, particularly younger members, to sit on the committee and make a difference. If we have no success in attracting new members then the group may need to go into recess for twelve months with the view to winding up the incorporated group. This would be a sad day for the one incorporated environmental group in the Greater Gingin area. Ordinary members are also welcome. If you feel you can contribute, please contact the Gingin Water Group or attend the AGM, to be held at 6.15pm of 16th March 2023 at the Gingin Golf Club.

Membership of \$22 is now due for the calendar year 2023.

Local Business Profile

The Local Goat



867 Coonabidgee Road, Coonabidgee WA 6503 (12km West of Gingin Townsite)

Why did you choose to make your own goat products and what do you enjoy the most about it?

After buying one dairy goat for our own milk consumption in 2012 and then breeding her daughter, it was a case of what to do with the excess milk? I attended a one-day cheesemaking course in the Swan Valley and really enjoyed it, then started experimenting with different recipes.

Cheesemaking is very time and temperature critical, and I like the precise nature of cheesemaking. The milk is in the goat's udder in the morning and by the evening I have transformed it into cheese!

Who are you and your role within the business?

Gerald Drummond – manages our property and the dairy goats - milking and caring for them every day. Healthy, happy goats give nutritious milk. Later in the day, Gerald is turning cheeses, which is required regularly for correct maturing.

Julie Drummond – cheesemaking and admin. First thing in the morning, and before opening the farm gate, I sanitise all the cheesemaking equipment, then process the milk for cheesemaking. It takes 90 minutes to pasteurise the milk at 69.4 degrees Celsius, then another 90 minutes to cool it to 33 degrees Celsius, before you add the starter culture. Then there are one-hour intervals in the process, where I care for cheeses made the previous

days. Hooping the cheese into the moulds usually happens around 5pm and the cheeses are turned for the rest of the evening.

How long have you been running the Local Goat?

We began making cheese daily in January 2018. The dairy goats suit our property as they don't need green pasture, compared to dairy cows. They need a lot of roughage in their diet and our bush block suits them. We only use about one-third of our 148-acre property and have left rest to stay as bush.

After favourable comments from a Cheesemonger, we thought there was a possibility of making a living while staying on our property.

What makes the Local Goat successful?

We use mineral fertiliser on our paddocks which have been coated with microbes. This helps build the health of the soil, which means more nutritious plants and in turn, healthier goats. As more people become interested in where their food comes from and support local producers, our farm gate is becoming more popular.

What keeps you motivated to go to work each day?

It is very rewarding to see the reaction when people try our cheeses and gelato. Most goat milk cheeses are quite strong and pungent, while ours have a fresh, clean taste. Goat milk can usually be tolerated by people with lactose sensitivity, so it is fantastic to be able to help them.

Why you choose to run the Local Goat in Gingin?

We moved to Gingin in 2007 and enjoy the healthy, family environment of a rural area, while being within cooee of the city, which helps with weekly deliveries to Perth.

What is the Local Goat's greatest achievement?

We have entered our cheeses and gelato in the Royal Agricultural Society Perth Royal Food Awards and the Dairy Industry Association of Australia WA Dairy Product Competitions. We have received many gold and silver awards, but the highlight would have to be the Perth Royal Food Awards Champion Product in 2021.

Goals for the future?

More sleep!

What would you like to achieve with in the business?

Our aim is to supply quality produce to local people at a fair price.

Favourite past time?

Time spent in the garden and veggie patch.

Tell us an interesting fact about your-self?

Our property is serviced by a stand-alone solar power system and rain water and we live in a straw bale house.

WA champion Wade McCarthy and his highly rated son Coby made the big trek to compete. Wade competed in two events, Bullriding and Steer Wrestling. He succeeded in taking out the number 1 spot and was awarded the ABCRA National All-round Cowboy and Bullriding Title.

Coby McCarthy, in his first national final, was ranked number 2 for the 8 to Under 11 Steer ride. He had tough competition

stretching over 3 days, with only two points between himself and third place in the standings. Day 3 he secured his spot as Runner Up Champion 8 to 11 Steer Rider, by covering two of his three steers. A very special time to be able to compete at this event along with his dad.

Another local to Gingin, cowgirl Hunta Gallacher went in to the finals sitting at number two for Champion All Around Cowgirl and Runner Up Champion Barrel Racer for 2022. Only a few points behind the number 1 position for All Around Cowgirl, Hunta competed in her respective events Ladies Barrel Race, Breakaway Steer Undecorating and Roping. The cowgirls in Tamworth were competition. **Entertaining** fierce spectators immensely. cowgirl maintained her position as Runner Up Champion Cowgirl and Runner Up Champion Barrel Racer.

With over 20 Cowboys and Cowgirls representing WA. They did a stella job and the rodeo community is extremely proud.

We hope WA has another great year and hope to see them all back competing at the finals for 2023.

Why the Shire Disables Comments on Social Media



We've received queries from the public about why we disable comments on Shire Facebook posts.

Historically, the Shire of Gingin embraced social media as a useful two-way means of communication with our communities.

However, in recent years we've had to deal with – as have most public service organisations - increasingly hostile, divisive, and unreasonable online interaction from the public, usually because of a decision or course of action the Shire has made that people don't like or agree with, which then results in lengthy and sometimes vicious diatribes on Facebook. This makes responding by Shire officers in a constructive and meaningful way almost impossible.

Also, local governments are bound to recordkeeping policies and regulations which apply to electronic media communication. We simply do not have the resources to monitor, moderate, respond to and record all the threads, comments, and posts on our Facebook page. For this reason, and in the interests of transparency, we do our best to 'share' our posts to the various community group Facebook pages in the region where members of the public can make whatever comment they wish.

In saying that, if you have read or heard something about the Shire that is of concern to you, we strongly encourage you to either give us a call on 9575 5100 or send us an email to mail@gingin.wa.gov.au in the first instance so we can clarify our position and provide you with the facts. By doing so, you will help to shut down rumour mills that cause confusion and angst in your community.

While we respect everyone's right to their opinion, we also reserve the right to moderate social media communication in a way that we see fit and appropriate for our organisation.

Past Gingin News

When looking for past Gingin News Editions in the Gingin Shire Archives, I realised that their holding was incomplete. I wonder, did you know that a copy of our "Buzz" and previously produced Gingin News ("News") have been forwarded to the Archives of the State Library at the time of their production?

In an endeavour to provide physical copies of the "News" for people to read in the library, my next port of call was to look at the Trove Online Collection. Unfortunately, I found that nothing that new has been electronically stored so a visit to the J.S. Battye Library of West Australian History in Perth, was needed to gain access to the full catalogue of past issues.

It was interesting to find at the State Library copies, that after a few years the Gingin News was revamped as the Gingin Community News, which was produced by private individuals. I am still investigating as to when the Gingin Telecentre or Gingin Community Resource Centre, which we are now known, took over the publication.

I hope that going forward, in each Buzz, to provide a snippet from the past editions of the Gingin News and Gingin Community News. To me this is our Towns more recent history with which, some that have lived it, can reminisce the times gone by and inform the newer members of the district of what has happened to shape their community.

In the very first publication dated December 1977, amongst its articles from sporting clubs, news of the school, information concerning the Religious Denominations and of course, what was happening with the Shire Council it advised that Beermullah was about to get power.

Those in the area could elect to pay the State for installation of power lines to supply electricity to their holdings. Prior to that farms had to generate their own power. Not everyone joined the scheme and continued to generate their own power.

The scheme wasn't ready in April 1978 as predicted and not up and going until at least August of that year as I recall.

As a newlywed living in Beermullah in August 1978, I dreaded the generator and me having to start it. The threat of the "kick back", scared the living daylights out of me. Our generator didn't have an electric start so you had to wind the thing up!!!


Having always lived in Gingin town or Perth, I was ecstatic that we were about to get, what I had taken my whole life as a given. Lucky for me the generator and I had a very short-lived relationship as the the State Electricity Commission took pity and connected our house before the official startup date.

From the Gingin News: December 1977:

In July of this year Mr. B.W. Roe was informed by the State Energy Commission that power would be extended to the Beermullah area to service the twenty five subscribers who have signed documents guaranteeing the payment of \$1,064.00 each to cover the cost. It is hoped that work will commence on the reticulation during the month of December and completed by April, 1978.

The scouts have just celebrated their 40th Birthday with a function at the Scout Hall on the 18 February 2023. Looking back at the December 1982, 16th Edition, page 25 the "News" announced that Cubs were underway in Gingin and Scouts were just waiting on the recruitment of leaders.

Gingin News: December 1982



The following edition produced in April 1983, Volume 17, page 32 reported the investiture of the Gingin Scout Group Leader along with 3 Cub Leaders by the WA Scout Movement on the 4 March 1983. A week later Mr and Mrs "Bert Crane" attended the induction of the first Cubs into the Group. Who was Bert? Mr Crane was at the time, the well-respected member for Moore in the Legislative Assembly of Western Australia. He served as the member for Moore from 1974 to 1989, initially representing the National Country Party and from 1985, the Liberal Party.

Gingin News: April 1983

GINGIN SCOUT GROUP

On March 4th, two representatives of the Scout Movement were invited to Gingin to invest the 3 Cub Leaders and Group Leader. This in turn enabled the leaders to invest the Cubs.

On March 11th, all parents, some grandparents, friends and Mr and Mrs A V Crane witnessed the Investiture of 27 Uniformed Cubs. Upon their Investiture, the Cubs were presented with their group scarf and all relevant badges. Mr Crane then presented the group with an Australian flag and numerous other items.





The woman sat on the other side of the desk on the verge of tears. The contents of her shopping bag lay strewn in front of her, with the red sweater and blue blouse in plain view. The rain hammered on the large office window, obscuring the perfect view of the city and Harbour Bridge below. I was happy about the way my store manager was handling the situation, and the police woman stood nonchalantly over in the corner. She had the air of someone who had seen it all before.

I suppose it was the way she tossed her head that brought me up with a shock. She only did it once, but *I knew*. There was no doubt about it. It was 'Super Sally'! The years rolled back......

After Dad died, Mum really had to struggle. I swore I had the same pair of school shorts for two whole years. Luckily Mum was able to get most of my stuff from the second-hand shop, or some of the neighbours giving her hand-me downs. She always made sure us boys had enough to eat though, even if sometimes I think she went without herself. I did what I could to look after Bertie, my younger brother, and had to grow up quickly. I used to make breakfast for us both when Mum went to work, or we simply missed out when there was nothing in the house, which was often.

At school I was always a bit embarrassed when it came to Physical Education, and some of the boys saw my shoddy underwear. They used to tease me about it, but I couldn't really say anything. It was rotten being poor, when they seemed to have so much. I was at that age when the girls all looked good, especially those that were the 'girlfriends' of some of the boys in my class. Sally Barfield had come to school late in the first term, and was immediately popular. She had long blonde hair, big green eyes and a very infectious giggle, that you could hear echoing round the corridors between classes. She flitted from one conquest to the next, never keeping a boyfriend any more than a couple of weeks. Of course, even though she was in my class, all the boys she went out with were in the senior years. She soon got the nickname 'Super Sally'.

Despite all this, and knowing I didn't stand a chance, I was besotted with her. I simply couldn't get her out of my mind. Everything she did seemed to be perfect. The way she walked, the way she talked, the way she tossed her head.... Just about every song I heard was about her, it seemed.

It was coming up to the school dinner dance, and all the boys were talking about it. It was a way the boys could all mingle with the girls—new friendships were made, some lasting, some not, but mainly it was a way for the boys and girls to show off to one another. The boys would dress in new gear, and the girls would have special dresses their doting parents bought for them. The school newsletter came home a few weeks before, and I saw Mum reading it, and looked sadly at me.

"Sorry, Jimmy," she said, "I don't think I can afford..."

"It's OK Mum," I lied, "I didn't really want to go anyway."

I don't know how she did it, but the very next payday, Mum managed to do something amazing. There on the bed when I came home from school was the most fantastic new shirt! It was perfect! My Saturday morning job at the pet shop didn't give us much, but Mum insisted I should use it for the ticket. "I'll manage," she said, despite my protests.

The school gym was a blaze of light and colour on the night of the dinner dance, and after the meal, the tables were all moved back against the walls, and the music cranked up. All the good dancers were anxious to do their thing, and quickly got on the floor. I watched Super Sally dance with three or four different older boys, and stood gloomily on the sidelines, trying to get up courage to ask her. I suppose what pushed me into it, was seeing Andrew Quail from my class go up to her. I was amazed to see him on the floor with Sally, who was apparently quite happy to dance with him. As soon as I was able, I went up to her where she was standing with a group of her friends and said "Sally, I was
