

Gingin Community Op Shop – The Treasure Trove @ Gingin

Then up spoke bold Carolyn¹, The keeper of the door. "This is a shop for everyone, However rich or poor. There is nowhere to shop better. In Gingin or the State, Than the Treasure Trove, now open Make sure you are not late."² **For our beautiful bargains obviously!**

Once upon a time, because that's the way all good stories start, a small wheatbelt town called Gingin had a Red Cross Op shop. For no obvious reason in 2013 the op shop was shut, which surprised and dismayed the people who worked there and caused even more aggravation to the people who relied on getting a bargain in the op shop. It's a fact that money can be very tight in small rural towns and the other 'cheap' shops are a long drive away.

Some of the ladies who had worked in the ex-shop, along with other Ginginites, decided that they could & would do better.

A shed, which could be rented cheaply, was found and a community meeting called; a

slightly surprising number of people turned up. Oddly some of them had never been in an op shop before but they understood the need and were prepared to volunteer to make the replacement op shop a success. In August 2013, after an enormous amount of cleaning and fettling, in what had been disused shed full of unpleasant 'stuff', the Gingin **Community** Op Shop T/A The Treasure Trove @ Gingin opened. Seriously, it was an immense effort on the part of the people put together the necessary fixture & fittings on a nil budget; they are the heroines/heroes of this story.

From the beginning there was a determination that the *temporary* shed shop behind the Gull servo would be the absolute best op shop it could possibly be. For nine years around thirty volunteers have worked to keep the shop open for three hours a day, six days a week. Customers quickly noticed that there were quality preloved clothes and a myriad of other clean treasures at very reasonable prices. Not only did the shop attract customers from across the Shire and Northern Perth suburbs it also attracted donations. Lots and lots of wonderful donations because recycling, upcycling and

repurposing had finally become fashionable. With so many donations the Treasure Trove has been able to supply appropriate surplus items to Paraquad in Perth and to remote Op Shops around Warburton. It also supplies Wheelchairs for Kids with soft toys and shop volunteers cut unsalable clothes into rags which have a very definite value.

It was a founding principle of TT@G that after the bills were paid the monies generated should be used to support the people, both young & old along with the voluntary groups, in the Shire via grants and that a 'building' fund be accumulated for the day when the shop could move out of the shed. Giving away money has been relatively easy because the grant forms are so simple. There are hardly any groups, sporting or social in Gingin that have not benefitted. Some grants have been quite large - the community car, the new playground & the school chaplaincy and others relatively small - Anzac Day Gunfire Breakfast and the 150th Anniversary duck race.

However, saving money for a new shop and finding suitable premises has been much, much more difficult. There have been empty blocks but none entirely suitable and residents don't necessarily want an op shop next door. The Old Fire Station, when vacated, was an obvious choice but it has taken six interminable years to get from that idea to reality. Six years and a great deal of planning & paperwork (thanks Kate Watson & Trevor Phillips), building work (thanks Shane Troy) and money (mega thanks volunteers & customers) to make it happen. The TT@GG finally became lease holders of the Old Fire Station in November 2022. The building work started almost immediately and the final piece of paper, the Certificate of Occupancy was received at the beginning of April 2023. Over a frenetic 10 days, including Easter weekend, the shed shop was moved, lock, stock and fittings by the volunteers and their partners. The lovely new community op shop opened in the Old Fire Station on Monday 17th April.

It's still a little bit of a work in progress, there are things which will change and oddly it's slightly weird working with so much space however it's a shining example of what a community group, working together, can achieve. If you haven't been for a look already, please come and say 'Hi' to The Treasure Trove @ Gingin at 13 Robinson Street soon because this isn't the end of the story, it's just the beginning of a new chapter.

Norm Wallace "Castle Builder" Book Launch

On Tuesday 18 April, approximately 70 family, friends, and former colleagues of longtime community member and Shire Clerk of 33 years, Norm Wallace, met up at the Shire Council Chambers and Committee Room in Gingin to celebrate the launch of his book "Castle Builder".

For many attendees, the book launch provided a rare and special occasion to reconnect with people they hadn't seen for many years, and this created a joyful, uplifting vibe which Norm would have loved.

Sadly, Norm passed away on 26 April 2022 – almost a year before the book was published - however stepping in to see it completed was son Garry, with the support of his sisters Barbara and Terrel.

"There is a story behind the creation of this book," said Garry. "It started with Dad's cancer diagnosis in 2018. His oncologist advised that with treatment his prognosis would give him another four years, and he asked about Dad's hobbies and interests because he would need something to occupy his mind.

"Dad had thought about writing about his life as Shire Clerk for the Gingin Shire Council and over the next four years, with the help of several people and historical records, the draft progressed to include information not only about Dad's life, but also about other Shire employees, events, families, organisations and historical events. He was especially attentive to the development of the coastal towns and special rural zones." Dad, and this is where I stepped in to help. Dad collected the data and produced the first draft. I then undertook editing and checked source records from the Shire and State Library. We then had several Gingin community members and my wife read the manuscript and provide feedback. The publisher then gave it polish."

The title of the book "Castle Builder" was the result of Norm's determination to forge a successful life in the Shire of Gingin.

"Dad was a planner, an opportunist, and a visionary who didn't undertake any activity until he had completed the planning in his mind. He visualised establishing himself and his family, and stuck to that vision. The Gingin Shire provided that opportunity. This was his castle, and this became the title of the book."

In April 1993, when Norm retired from Shire service, Gavin Drew – who was the Shire President at that time – presented Norm with a certificate of appreciation. In return, 30 years later, Garry was pleased to present Gavin with a copy of the "Castle Builder" on the night.

"This book is a gift to the Gingin Shire community," added Garry. "Dad didn't want it registered for sale but had fifty copies printed for gifting, and we have made copies available in the Gingin and Lancelin libraries."

Whilst the book is about Norm's life, it has a strong focus on his years as Shire Clerk and covers significant details in the development of the Gingin Shire and coastal towns.

On 8 May, the State Library of WA will formally release the "Castle Builder" into its repository.



Gingin Heifer Competition

The 2023 Gingin Heifer Competition, held 30th March, saw Plain Grazing (Brett, Lisa and Chase Edwards) from Beermullah, take out the keenly contested top prize for the best pen of four Commercial Heifers by Richard Hall, from Golden Arm Genetics.

16 pens of the region's best commercial heifers were assessed across 9 Gingin farming properties.

2023 Commercial Heifer winners were:

1st prize – Plain Grazing (Brett, Lisa and Chase Edwards), Angus

2nd prize –Angela, Shahni and Jarod Clifton (Angus)

Equal 3rd prize – Old Bambun Grazing (Angus) and The Grant Family, Gingin (Red Angus) Ed and Paul Grant

It was the first time the Edwards family has one the competition, now in its 41st year. The crowd of over 45 onlookers were impressed with the quality of the pen of four black angus heifers aged 11 months which scored 87 points out of a possible 100.

The heifers are judged on their suitability as future breeders. Points are awarded for temperament, structural soundness, femininity, carcass quality and evenness of pen. Judge Richard Hall said, "I was very fortunate to be invited to judge the long running Gingin heifer competition for 2023. The quality of all the cattle presented before me was outstanding which made my job extremely difficult. Just as impressive as the quality of the cattle was the enthusiastic nature of all the exhibitors towards the day and their cattle. It was obvious to me that all involved had a passion for their cattle and that they put a lot of thought into the selection of the bulls they purchased and the direction of their breeding programs. Common themes of discussion were longevity (reflected in the outstanding structural soundness of all the cattle presented before me), temperament (once again reflected in the quiet nature of all the heifers) and ability of the cattle to thrive in the unique environment of the Gingin Shire.

The competition is a credit to all involved and I would recommend anyone who has a passion for commercial cattle to pencil this day in their calendar and enjoy not only the quality of cattle on display but also the tremendous welcoming spirit and hospitality and passion for the beef cattle industry of all involved in the day."

Once again, lunch was prepared by Beermullah local, Selga Beckwith. It was spon-

Sean Greenwell won the prestigious "Closest to the Judges award". Lewis Roe was the winner of the "Guess the weight" award.

Competition winners were announced at the wind-up event sponsored by Zoetis and hosted by Phil and Sally Barret-Lennard in their wonderfully restored old shearing shed.

Competition coordinator, Mr David Roe of Benalong Grazing said "The Gingin Heifer competition continues to be a great day for local cattle breeders. Breeders continue to take on board the judge's comments to aid their selection criteria for their future breeders and this can only be good for their cow herds. Richards' life time work in beef genetics and his knowledge of the animals structure, particularly the pelvic and reproductive setup on the heifers was particularly enlightening".

Mr Roe also extended his thanks to all competition entrants, and the generosity of sponsors who make the day possible, W & J Greenwell, Gingin Districts Community Financial Services Ltd - Bendigo Bank, Gingin Fuel and Tyres, Elders, Zoetis and Boehringer Animal Health. He is also very appreciative of the great work Annette Howard did photographing all the exhibitors and cattle.

Over the past few weeks, with the assistance of another local resident, she has cleared out the beds of weeds and former plantings, dug them over, fertilized and is now in the process of planting an array of winter seedlings, seeds and tubers – onions, potatoes, garlic, peas, carrots, capsicums, cabbages, broccoli and spinach.

Norma has bought the seeds herself and will be using blood and bone and homemade compost to give the plants a good start. She is now hoping for some soaking rains, although the beds are currently getting a daily water from a set of timed sprinklers. These too required checking to ensure all the nozzles were patent.

Norma's tips for gardening include - plant

Greenfeast peas in a herringbone pattern, plant all potatoes in the vertical position with an "eye to the sky" (she does not "hill" her potatoes) and cut the tips off onion seedlings by a few millimetres prior to planting. Norma follows the same traditions as were carried out by her Mother over 100 ago and she says that in general, her "vegie patch" have always given good crops. She shows no mercy to any marauding snails!!

So, if you see Norma at her "Patch" go and say "Hi". Norma is a mine full of information about the district. She attended the old Beermullah School, went to the local dances, was a champion golfer and lawn bowler and in more recent times a fabulous fund-raiser for the RFDS, the Heart Foundation and the Cancer Foundation through her "garden and quiz days".

Norma keeps on giving and we hope her new garden "gives" back to her this year.

*Note the huge sweet potatoes Norma dug from one of the garden beds prior to commencing her work – some weighed over 3 kilos. The more moderate sized potatoes have been "brushed" and were left in two crates at the CRC Office. They can be taken free of charge.

ANZAC Day 2023 In Remembrance of Those Who Came Home

This year's theme for the Gingin ANZAC Day service was "In Remembrance of Those Who Came Home" and included a moving tribute to two local Indigenous soldiers - Trooper James Dickerson and Private Walter Parker.

The commemoration drew a large crowd into Gingin which began with a Walk of Reflection from the Gingin Craft Rooms to the ANZAC Memorial at the Shire Office. While local Scouts, Cubs and Cadets kept vigil, Lindsay Conway Major Retd from the Gingin Pensioners Social Club spoke about returning from Vietnam and the difficulties of being in the "The Forgotten War".

The service then moved to the Granville Park Soundshell where Robert Brodie-Hall gave the Welcome Message, followed by Ray Budge from the Uniting Church who did a Bible scripture reading of John 10:11-15.

The first ANZAC Day address was delivered by Deputy Shire President Andrea Vis, who related the extraordinary wartime experiences of two Indigenous soldiers who were also half-brothers - from Gingin.

"Trooper George James Dickerson, commonly known as James Dickerson, was born at Gingin in 1883. He joined the 10th Light Horse Regiment and embarked for Gallipoli on 17 Feb 1915 aboard HMAT "Surada". He received gunshot wounds on 29 August 1915 at Gallipoli and died the next day. He was buried at sea 50 miles off the Gallipoli Coast and is memorialized at Lone Pine. Trooper James Dickerson was the only Western Australian Aboriginal serviceman to die during the Gallipoli Campaign.

"Prior to the Gallipoli campaign Private Walter Joseph Parker was one of 10 Indigenous soldiers to enlist and serve in the Boer War in 1901. He was born in 1874 at Gingin and served with the 5th West Australian Mounted Infantry Contingent in Eastern Transvaal, Natal, and Orange Free State Provinces in South Africa from 1901-1902. He contracted typhoid fever and died 2 January 1902 at Standerton, in the Province of Mpumalanga, South Africa. Walter James Parker was the first Indigenous soldier to die in service for Australia."

The Prayer for Those Who Are Suffering from War was then read by Felicity Scott from the Gingin Red Cross.

The second ANZAC Day address was given by Warrant Officer Ian Griffiths Retired

Air Force who spoke about what it was like returning from military service in Iraq and Afghanistan, and how professional help and giving back to the community has been a big part of his recovery.

Leading the One Minute Silence and delivering The Ode was Lindsay Conway, and the Prayer for Peace was read by Gingin District High School student, Elliot Dale. Performing The Last Post and Reveille on trumpet was Renee Ging, and bag piper Ben Treloar and local musician Kelly Gardner provided moving music throughout the service.

The service concluded with the laying of wreaths by community representatives at the Wall of Remembrance, followed by a Gunfire Breakfast provided and served by the Pensioners Social Club and volunteers.

Gingin Bowling Club Roof Restoration

The project was undertaken by MidWest Building, Billy Ellwood Building Services, and Roof Restorers Perth, and took approximately 4 weeks to complete.



Upcoming Projects

As we head into the cooler seasons, our Operations teams will be undertaking the following works and projects in the coming months:

Asset Works

- Removing bore stains, internal upgrades ie, hot water systems to bathrooms, kitchen upgrades at Gingin Bowling Club.
- Pre & post emergent application to sports turf in Lancelin and Gingin.
- Replacement of ~30 fence posts at Ledge Point tennis courts.
- Topping up soft fall at GOAS playground plus timber staining of original fence to match new.
- Major internal renovation to DeBurgh St ablution block, Ledge Point.
- External works including drains at CU@Park to combat winter water ingress issues.
- Relocating ambulance access gate and overflow carpark works at Guilderton Bowling Club.
- Drainage, replacement of fence with colorbond, and garden works at Treasure Trove building.

Road Maintenance Works

- Annual slashing, drain clearing, and weed spraying duties around the Shire.
- Curbing repairs to a number of sites in Guilderton.
- Street sign install and replacement of damaged signage, Gingin, Guilderton, and along Gingin Brook Road.

Construction Works

- Annual road maintenance grading program commenced.
- Seabird seawall maintenance commenced.



Where does the water from Gingin's brooks, end up?

Waterways can be grouped into catchments. A catchment consists of a river or major stream, all the smaller streams which flow into it and the land from which water flows into any of those streams.

The Shire of Gingin is largely covered by the Gingin Brook Catchment which forms part of the larger Moore River Catchment. Gingin Brook flows into the Moore River at Neergabby and hence into the ocean at Guilderton. The main streams which flow into the Gingin Brook forming the catchment, are Red Gully and Red Gully South Creeks, Whitfield Brook, Boonanarring Brook, Wallering Brook, Mungala Brook, Moondah Brook, Wowra Brook, Quin Brook and Lennard Brook.

Lennard Brook is interesting in that water

from it may flow into the Gingin Brook, via a series of interconnected wetlands and the Quin Brook, or may flow, again via a series of interconnected wetlands, into the Chandala Brook. Nullable and Breera Brooks in the south eastern part of the shire also flow via wetlands into Chandala Brook. Chandala Brook flows into the Ellen Brook which then flows into the Swan River near the West Swan Rd bridge. These southern streams form part of the Ellen Brook Catchment, which is a large contributor of nutrients to the Swan River.

In the far north-eastern part of the Gingin Shire, Wannamal Lake is part of the Brockman River Catchment. The Brockman River flows through the Chittering Shire and into the Avon River east of Bullsbrook in the City of Swan. The Avon River then joins the Swan River. So, Wannamal Lake and Fremantle, although they seem quite isolated from one another, are connected when the rivers are flowing.

This demonstrates the importance of protecting our land and waterways and is the direction the Gingin Water Group is looking towards. Discussion about the future direction of the group will form part of the next meeting and new members are wel-

May has brought our first decent rains and a cooling down and the farmers will be getting pastures ready for seeding. Our house gardens are waiting for that last bit of care before they settle in for the winter. The vegie patch is waiting for winter crops and clearing out the last of the summer crops. It's time for leafy greens like lettuce, cabbage, spinach, rocket and Asian greens. Pop in some coriander, parsley, oregano, and chamomile.

Home grown spuds are easy and well worth growing. Other veggies to try are carrots, artichoke, beetroot, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cauliflower, radish and peas. You will have more than you can eat in no time.

Plants need a feed at this time of year. A seaweed tea or any good quality liquid fertiliser is perfect for a kick start for seedling to get established as well as the established garden. Pop in some flower's marigolds, sunflowers, pansies, cornflowers, violas etc. Putting these amongst your vegcome to attend to put forward ideas.

gies not only adds colour and interest but they also act to attract beneficial insects. Keep an eye on your watering as we get some rainy days to make sure if your retic is off that your plants are getting enough water and soil is not hydrophobic. Watering first thing in the morning at this time of year is preferable. Mulch to suppress weeds which can take over quickly with the change of weather, select a mulch that will enrich your soil as it breaks down.

I have made a start in my own garden but by no means is it finished still enjoying a good crop of beans which are bound to end soon. The Monarch butterflies in my garden are still doing their thing. The caterpillars are spectacular and the chrysalis with the finest gold thread on the outer edge dangle on plants like little fairy lanterns. They have eaten nearly all of their host plants so I guess this too will shortly come to an end, but I will look forward to their appearance again next season. Meanwhile enjoy your garden and the change of season. CP

Past Gingin News

Planting trees is important for mitigating the effects of climate change. Trees absorb carbon dioxide from the atmosphere during photosynthesis and store it in their biomass. This helps to reduce the amount of greenhouse gases and slow down the rate of global warming. Additionally, trees help to stabilize soil, prevent erosion and provide critical habitats for wildlife. Planting trees is a simple and effective way to help combat climate change and make a positive impact on the environment.

In the 5th edition of the Gingin News ("News"), it was interesting to find a list of native trees that were suitable for the different soil types found in our Shire. Many tree species recommended 44 years ago are still applicable and relevant today. If you are looking for trees to plant this Autumn, it could be a good idea to start with any of these.

From the Gingin News: March 1979:

MATIVE TREES FOR THE GINGIN AREA While many of our native trees do not like changes in their environment some do not mind and many do well in the Gingin area. The Gingin Shire varies considerably as to soil types and the trees which do well in the heavier soils are generally not suitable for the coastal districts. Trees suitable for the home garden in the heavier soils are mostly of the mallee type, these seldom exceed 20 feet and are generally recognisable by their thick leaves. These can be divided into two groups - those noted for the beauty of their flowers, and those with outstanding foliage. The first includes the following Eucalypts - Preissana, Caesia, Stoatei, Forrestiana, Macrocarpa, Rhodanthus, Torquata, Pyriformis, Kruseana, Noodwardi and Ficifolia. The second group, the Eucalypts Kruneana, Macrocarpa, Crusis and Tetragona, and Casurina Torulosa (Rose She Oak). Coastal areas having sandy soils need different trees and the following do well - Angonis Flexuosa (Peppermint) and the Eucalypts Platypus, Lehmanni, Doratoxylon, Gomphecephala, and Nicholi; also Eucalyptus Erythrocorys (Illyarri) is good. For the farm no tree is better than Eucalyptus Camaldulensis (River Gum) because of its wide tolerance of soil types and its acceptance of wet or dry conditions. It is a very quick grower and coupled with its pleasing weeping or upright habit it is a must for every farm. For shelter belts on the farm Eucalyptus Lehmanni or Platypus are very suitable. Whilst botanical names have generally been used this is to save confusion when purchasing plants as sometimes there are several common names to the one tree.

Did you know that if you want to read a book that isn't on our library shelves, the book can be requested from any of the local libraries throughout Western Australia.

Hard copy catalogues are no longer the option but instead an online ordering system is now the way to go. The Library Staff can look through the online catalogues to find books that are not located on our shelves. Libraries from all over the state have their inventory listed and we can request a book be couriered to our library from them, for you.

The Committee invites written, video or audio submissions to the inquiry by 16 June 2023.


