

### Feature Story **100 years of Community Sport at the Wannamal** Tennis Club

The Wannamal Tennis Club, with its rich history dating back a century, celebrated its 100th birthday in grand style. The landmark celebration was held at the beloved Wannamal Tennis Club, and it featured live music, heartwarming speeches, and the ceremonial cutting of the club's centenary birthday cake.

As early as 1915 there was talk of forming a Tennis Club, the main instigator being Ted Wells. Unfortunately, the outbreak of World War I interrupted these plans until 1921 when the club saw its first official activity – a memorable tennis dance. The sport steadily gained ground, and by 1923, tennis was being played at various locations, including Ellisford Olive Hill and Cowara Hills. In the 1930s, two tennis courts were constructed at the present site, with an additional two courts added in 1938. These early courts were made from crushed and rolled ant hills. A bough shed, serving as the club's tennis shed, was erected, complete with an open fire for boiling the billy.

While there is limited information available about the club's activities during World War II, the 1950s marked the beginning of a flourishing period for tennis in the community. Throughout the decades, were made numerous upgrades to the court surfaces. culminating in a collaborative effort in 1980 when the community came together to lay a hot mix base that still forms the foundation for the courts today. Notably, lighting was installed at the same time, initially utilizing SEC poles and later the lights seen today, added around 2009.

Tennis has always held a special place in the heart of the Wannamal community. Sunday afternoon tennis was a cherished tradition until the club transitioned to mid-week nights to take full advantage of the excellent lighting facilities. What's heartwarming to see is that many current members have a familial connection to the club, with their parents, grandparents, and even great-grandparents being actively involved in the past.



The Tennis shed that stands today was aptly named the Thompson Memorial Pavilion to honour the Thompson family's significant contributions to the community. The Thompsons not only volunteered their time but also made generous donations to the community centre. Over the years, the club has hosted various tournaments, catering to both adult and junior players. It also played an essential role in providing junior tennis coaching, both at the club and the zone level.

In the late 1980s, Wannamal introduced a pennants side to its tennis endeavours, a tradition that continued until 2015. The club's remarkable journey saw it clinch numerous A Grade Shields against much larger tennis towns, reflecting the club's enduring competitive spirit. It's worth noting that back in the day, winning the A Reserve was the stepping stone to securing a place in the prestigious A Grade. The Wannamal Tennis Club's remarkable centenary celebration wouldn't have been possible without the generous support of its sponsors, who played a vital role in making the event a resounding success. The club extended its heartfelt gratitude to the sponsors, including The Shire of Chittering, Bendigo Community Bank Bindoon, Bullsbrook and Ellenbrook, Elders Muchea, CSBP, Tennis WA, and Boekeman Machinery.

As the club enters its second century, it does so with a sense of pride and gratitude for its past, a commitment to its present, and a vision for the future. The players, both past and present, and the life members of the community are a testament to the enduring spirit that has sustained the Wannamal Tennis Club for 100 years and will continue to do so for many more to come.

A Victorian regency style home with 15ft ceilings and Oregon timber throughout, a working windmill and well. It served as a military hospital during WW1 and as a maternity hospital in the years between the two wars.

The maternity hospital was closed in 1939 and after this it became a private home again.

In 2017 it was purchased by Sally and Garnett Hall and family. The house had started being restored by the previous owner now the job falls to Sally and Garnett and contending with the endless rules and regulations that come with a listing. improvements heritage Any internally have to be reversible so that the home may be put back exactly as it was when it was built. The garden is filled with colourful plants, cottage style with trees kept to the sides so as not to obscure the great ocean views held from the large veranda. From the front veranda you look down and across the large expanse of lawn, it was a very pleasant and relaxing vantage point.

Sally is a super keen gardener and was very welcoming, showing us throughout their home answering questions and chatting to all. Sally and Garnett both vets, operate West Coast Veterinary practice, a family business. And if Sally isn't impressive enough, she is also a doctor, a very inspiring young woman. ### Puglia Family Gears Up for Australian Polocrosse Nationals

A tale of dedication, the Puglia family is set to take a trip across Australia to the Australian Polocrosse National championships in Chinchilla, Queensland, scheduled for June 2024 to represent WA. Ryan and Lisa Puglia, alongside their cousin Abbie Parsons, have earned their spots in the national tournament after being selected from a number of gifted players at the recent competition in Kojonup.

The Puglia family's journey to the Nationals has been evident by numerous weekends spent at polocrosse carnivals across Western Australia. Their adventure began with their membership in the South Midlands Polocrosse Club in Muchea, and later, after relocating to Chapman Valley, they found a new home in the Walkaway club.

Ryan, soon to be 15, will be representing his family in the Nationals in the under 16 age group. Ryan and Abbie also participated in an Exhibition game at the 2023 Perth Royal Show. Meanwhile, Lisa and Abbie, both aged 11 will be part of the under 12 team. Sadly, Bradley aged 12, one of the youngest aiming for selection in the under 16 team missed out on selection. These young riders have been in the saddle from a young age, practicing regularly to earn their places in the team. Polocrosse, often hailed as the 'King of the OneHorseSport,'featuresteamscomprising six players. The game consists of 6 intense chukkas (time period), each lasting 6 minutes, with three players from each team in the field at any given time. What sets polocrosse apart is that each player has their own reliable horse that they train and compete with.

A major driving force behind the Puglia family's success has been their commitment to the sport. John and his father Tony have invested countless hours in teaching the children the nuances of riding and mastering polocrosse. Even the youngest member of the family, Lewis, aged just 5, has eagerly embarked on his own riding journey, thanks to the guidance of his older siblings, Ryan, Bradley and Lisa.

Jess, the linchpin of the family, tirelessly ensures that the horses are always ready to compete, meticulously adhering to dress requirements and keeping their nutrition on point. Taking care of their horses is a task the entire family partakes in, which includes bandaging legs, braiding tails, feeding, and rugging their horses.

As the family prepare themselves and their horses for the long trip to the other side of Australia, we wish them all the best. Make the most of not only the tournament but a great opportunity for a well-earned family holiday.

#### November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month

#### Did you know?

Lung cancer is the third most common cancer affecting both women and men in Western Australia.

In 2019, 693 Western Australian men and 564 Western Australian women were diagnosed with lung cancer.

#### Common symptoms of lung cancer include:

• Coughing or spitting up blood (once or more)

Or, for more than four weeks:

- A new cough or change to your usual cough
- A lot of chest infections
- Finding it hard to breathe
- Losing weight without trying
- Not feeling hungry
- Pain in your chest and/or shoulder
- Feeling tired or lacking energy
- Changes to your voice, such as hoarseness or croaky voice

If you have coughed up blood, even if it was just once, it's important to tell your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker straight away.

If you have had any of the other symptoms for more than four weeks, tell your doctor, clinic nurse or health worker. It doesn't mean you've got lung cancer – often these symptoms turn out to be something less serious. But it's important to tell your health professional and get checked out to be safe.

If it is lung cancer, the earlier it's found, the earlier it can be treated.

In addition, the meeting called for the election of Shire President and Deputy Shire President which saw a change of leadership as follows:



#### **COMMUNITY UPDATE**

#### **Clarification on Shire President Election Process**

The Shire of Gingin wishes to clarify comments circulating on social media following yesterday's Special Council Meeting that the role of Shire President should have been popularly elected through the election voting process, as per larger Local Governments.

The Shire of Gingin is a Tier 3 Local Government and, as such, a publicly elected head (such as President) is not a mandatory requirement, as it is for Tier 1 and 2 Councils. In fact, very few Presidents of Local Governments of our size are publicly elected.

The *Local Government Act* clearly outlines the requirements for the appointment of a Mayor and/or President, and should there be a desire to change this method, it must be resolved by Council and then an application made to the Minister. This would then, if accepted, apply to the next election of Council.

Regarding this, any changes to the election of the Shire of Gingin's Shire President would be a significant alteration to the current process and would warrant serious consideration and consultation. If it were then to be progressed, it would need to be planned and budgeted for at additional cost to the election process.

Please note that once a statutory local government election has commenced this process cannot be changed, so any resolution of Council and acceptance by the Minister would need to be facilitated prior to the commencement of the next election process.

## <u>Ging</u>in Glimpses Where Are They Now... And Their Contributions to

the Community

The question is often asked "I wonder where... is now?" after a long-term local resident is no longer seen at the local shops or has gone into hospital for acute care and has never returned to his or her home.

The following is a little bit about the contribution and life of former Gingin residents and where they are living now.

#### <u>Dot Glanz</u>

Dot Glanz was born, married and lived all her life in Gingin until she left the district to live with her daughter and s o n - i n - I a w approximately two years ago. Her departure came after a major health scare.



It was a very difficult decision for Dot to make, but she was embraced by the local **Kirup (near Donnybrook)** community with open arms – and as she says, "she could be out every day".

A major modification had to be made to her "new home" by way of a ramp into the house – initially to the horror of daughter Vi, but to the delight of Great Grandson Riley who also uses it as a skateboard ramp on his visits from Esperance!!

Dot's life history and her long-time employment and contribution to Gingin as a Telephonist at the Gingin Telephone Exchange was written for a Story Board and hung in the History section at Gingin's 150<sup>th</sup> Celebrations in 2021. Dot even has a bit of "living Gingin" with her – a sapling grown from the seed of a gum tree planted by her Great Uncle in the grounds of what are now Shire Offices. (The original tree was removed in recent times because of storm damage) and her very own Granville Water Lily Pond – the lilies are from the root stock retrieved from the Lily Pond that was filled in a couple of years ago near the Scenic Pool. Dot's daughter Vi created a special pond for them at their property - "**Chelmsfield**".

Dot also maintains connections with the local community through the Buzz and the Northern Valley News and visits the town for special occasions. She will be in Gingin for 4 days in December with daughter Vi to catch up with her "mates" and attend a local Christmas Street Party of friends and former neighbours.

That very difficult decision to leave Gingin has proved to be the best decision in Dots' eyes. Dot will be 90 in 2024.

#### **Barbara Cocking**

Barb Cocking "retired" to live in her home in Mortimer Street, Gingin some 26 years ago, having lived on the family farm at Wannamal with her husband Ted all her married life. (Ted continued to work in partnership with



his son Greg on the farm right up until his death and the farm still remains in family ownership). Barb did much in the community as a volunteer for many local causes when living at Wannamal and this caring for others continued with her arrival in Gingin. She was a great cook and provided many a meal and companionship for others – be it friends, neighbours or even family.

Barb became involved in the early days of remedial reading at the local school, volunteering to hear the students read and was a member of the local Arts and Crafts group through her China Painting.

Her great passion was football – whether it was the local Eagles or the Eagles AFL team. She knew all the members in the teams, their positions, how they played and the League tables. She was a regular spectator at most of the "Home or Away" matches, and her forte was the "behind the scenes work" at Ceremonies and Awards nights, Fund raisers and in the provision of food at the regular weekend matches. Barb baked and made countless cakes, sandwiches, casseroles and the like for these occasions – all as a volunteer, without remuneration and for the benefit of the Club.

During these last few years Barb was becoming less independent and finding it increasingly difficult to drive her car. Great support came from family and local carers in the community, but she had no immediate family living in the town to oversight her day to day care. Her frailty became more apparent, and she was at risk of falls - a hip replacement then became a reality. It was whilst in rehabilitation following her hip replacement, it was decided independent living at home for Barb was not a safe or practical option. So began an intensive search by her daughter-inlaw Donna to find a new home that would offer 24-hour assistance whilst providing interests and activities for Barb.

Barb's new address is **Aegis Shorehaven, 49 Scotthorn Drive, Alkimos.** Donna Cocking can be contacted for Barb's phone number and further information.

It has not been an easy transition for Barb, and she would welcome her friends from Gingin to visit her. There is a coffee shop within the complex and there are also nearby eateries, where Barb can be taken for an outing with assistance.

Coming up on Barb's social calendar is her attendance to the wedding of a Grandson in December; but before that is Barb's 90<sup>th</sup> birthday on November 8<sup>th</sup>. A celebration is to be held the following day, on Thursday the 9<sup>th</sup> of November, at our local <u>Cu@Park</u>.

#### **Footnote**

It is advisable to ring all Assisted Care Homes to find out their current policy on Covid and Influenza (Flu) vaccinations prior to visiting.

There is no consistent policy for all the Homes. In general, mandatory Covid vaccination is not required, but this is not the case for the "Flu" vaccine. Obviously, you should not be visiting if you are unwell.

Where there is "Covid" within the Home this will be clearly stated – posted on a Flyer to the Entrance Door, through a Social Media format or with phone contact. Some organisations have a complete Lock Down policy if there is Covid amongst its residents, others are more flexible. The latter, if you wish to continue with the visit, are likely to ask visitors to wear a mask and other protective clothing within the building, irrespective of whether the person you are visiting has Covid.

However, this does not prevent you from maintaining contact. Many care homes have independent phone connections available within the bedrooms, or have a handset that can be taken to, and used by the resident, or the resident may have use of their own mobile phone.

#### **Lancelin Shire Office Closure**

Due to recent threatening graffiti posted last Thursday directed at all Shire of Gingin staff and Elected Members, it has been necessary for the Shire to implement protection measures for all personnel which has included the closure of the Lancelin Shire Office until further notice.

The offensive graffiti was removed on the day it occurred limiting its visual impact, however as these messages threatened harm the matter is currently under investigation by Police.

The Shire CEO implemented the closure of the Lancelin Shire Office, as well as other necessary staff protection measures, in response to the threat which is being taken seriously. These actions are fully supported by the Elected Members and have unfortunately been forced upon – and are inconveniencing - the wider community. They will however remain in place until the matter is resolved.

This type of behaviour is abhorrent and completely unacceptable. Shire Staff and Elected Members do not deserve to be treated with disrespect, abuse, or be threatened with harm. The Shire will not tolerate this type of behaviour under any circumstances and Police will be notified in every instance.

When the matter is resolved, the Shire will provide an update - in the meantime this is all the information we are able to provide at this time.


#### What is a Rural Road Number?

Having a Rural Road Number (RRN) can assist in locating your property in the case of an emergency.

Rural property numbering is a simple distance based system - numbers are allocated in sequence, based on how far your property entrance is from the nearest road. Odd numbers are on the left and even numbers are on the right. If a property's number is 327, it's on the left side and three-point-two-seven kilometres from the start of the road.

There may be multiple lots with the same number on the same road and as the lot number does not indicate the location of your property; having a RRN helps our Emergency Services find your property.

You will need a crossover/driveway to allow our Rangers to measure and install your RRN. After the install, our Rates Department will update Landgate with your new number. The fee for this service including the sign is \$88. Please contact the Shire of Gingin if you would like a RRN installed or if you would like more information.

#### Firebreak Inspections 2023/24

The Shire of Gingin Rangers (Fire Control Officers) will be entering properties to complete the 2023/24 firebreak inspections as of 1 November 2023.

Owners and/or occupiers of land within the Shire of Gingin have a legal requirement under the Bush Fires Act 1954 to carry out fire mitigation, such as installing and maintaining a firebreak from 1 November to 15 May every year.

Your firebreak should be 3 metres wide with a minimum vertical clearance of 4 metres high to enable emergency vehicles to drive along the firebreaks without access being obstructed.



#### Do you have a plan to protect yourself in an emergency?

Emergencies can strike at anytime, anywhere and without warning. The good news is, it's easy to protect yourself, the people you love, and the things you value most.

Its important to have a realistic and suitable personal emergency plan. DFES and Red Cross have created some easy to follow checklists and guides to help with your planning, see the links below:

#### Affected by Stable Fly?

In previous years the Shire of Gingin has been affected by large populations of Stable Fly (Stomoxys calcitrans L.), particularly in the warmer weather. As a result the Shire works closely with the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) with a collective view to combating the problem.

Stable Fly can be a serious pest to livestock owing to its painful bite when it draws blood during feeding.





We wish Pat and Stacey continued happiness, adventures and memories as they start their married life together.



## Ants in your plants, and pavers?

# Want to know what your problem ants are and how to control them? You've come to the right place.

There are thousands of ant species in Australia, and most are difficult to identify without a microscope and specialist knowledge. There are very effective baits for some species, while others require control using sprays. Other species rarely need any control and can be left alone. Unless you know the species of ant, control can be guesswork, which can waste your time and money, and involve the unnecessary use of pesticides.

By submitting samples for identification, you can learn about the species of ants at your property and how to control them, plus you'll contribute to ant surveillance in WA. Detections in recent years of exotic and problematic species such as the African black sugar ant, red imported fire ant and browsing ant, is a testament to the ability of ants to arrive in WA via freight and cargo. Their rapid detection provides the best chance of eradication and prevents the economic, social and environmental impacts caused by these ants.

For ant identification services, we request that only **dead** specimens are submitted. This will prevent any unintended spread of the ants, whilst keeping the postie happy!

#### **Sampling instructions**

- Brush ants into a sealed container, Ziplock bag or collect ants using the sticky side of transparent tape and fix this gently to a piece of paper.
- Place sample in the freezer for 1-2 hours to kill any live ants.
- Label samples with the collection location e.g. backyard, kitchen, bathroom, driveway etc., and include a note with your name, address, contact number and email address.
- Deliver or post to: Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS), Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, 3 Baron-Hay Court, South Perth WA 6151.

Any suspected exotic ant species should be reported for biosecurity screening to the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.



Harry stood there for a long moment, snivelling, trying to make sense of his predicament. How could he convince anybody?


*I know,* he thought, *I'll go back and capture* one. They're only small. I bet the others would run away!
