

One less seat for regional Western Australia under the hands of Labor

Opposition and Nationals WA Leader Shane Love has expressed his deep disappointment with changes to the state's electoral boundaries, branding them a loss of fair representation for regional voters.

District boundaries are reviewed every four years to maintain similar populations in each electoral seat with the WA Electoral Commission considering communities of interest, land use patterns, Local Government boundaries, means of travel and distance from Perth.

Mr Love, also the Member for Moore, said the changes by the Commission, which amalgamate the seats of Moore and parts of North West Central into a giant seat of Mid West to make way for an additional metropolitan seat, Oakford, is a move that undermines regional voices.

"These changes, which take effect at the 2025 election, compound Labor's attacks on regional representation," Mr Love said.

"In a massive blow to regional communities, the 547 objections to the planned changes have today been set aside, with the Commission handing a win to WA Labor's blatant attacks on regional democracy."

Today's devastating result comes just two years after the WA Labor Government stripped 18 regional members from the Parliament when it abolished the upper house regions in 2021 and four months after they refused to support an amendment to the Electoral Reform Act 1907 to increase the Large District Allowance from 1.5 percent to three percent, which would have had the effect of retaining the current number of regional electorates.

Mr Love said the changes follow WA Labor's submission to the commission, which outlined their plan to abolish another regional voice, making it infeasible for equal representation. "Regional West Australians are suffocating under the hands of Labor," Mr Love said.

"Mid West is a huge electoral seat that will stretch from Muchea to Meekatharra, leaving communities voiceless to make way for yet another metro seat in Perth.

"This giant seat covers 420,000km² – more than five times the current seat Moore, double the size of Victoria and half the size of New South Wales.

"WA Labor have now stripped 19 members from the regions, botched cultural heritage laws, failed to support logging jobs and cowered behind the Federal Labor Government's live export ban.

"Today's changes mean when regional West Australians go to the ballot box, the voices of local schools, hospitals, councils and communities will be lost under Labor."

Gingin Brook Catchment Group

Have you heard of Amazon Frogbit?

Amazon Frogbit (Limnobium laevigatum) is



also known as South American Spongeplant due to the sponge-like bulge on the underside of the young leaves which float flat on the water surface. Adult leaves may be held above the water and the bulge is often

less distinct on these leaves. It is a floating aquatic plant native to South and Central America and promoted as an easy-care pond and aquarium plant.

However, in Australia, if it gets into the environment, it is a serious weed of fresh water wetlands and waterways. Research by the South East Regional Centre for Urban Landcare indicates the plants are also able to live in brackish water and when shaded by other plants. It reproduces by seed and also by vegetative division. Floating plants produce stolons, the ends of which develop into a new plant. This habit can quickly result in a dense mat. These mats can clog waterways, displace native species and impact water quality and wildlife habitat. Seed and small plants are easily transported in flowing water and on animals. An infestation was first found in WA in 2013, with many isolated occurrences being found since. All infestations are thought to have been the result of unwanted pond or aquarium contents being disposed of into wetlands or stormwater drains. An infestation was detected in the Gingin Brook in the Neergabby area in November this year. If you find anything you think might be Amazon Frogbit please report to <u>mypest-</u> <u>guide.agric.wa.gov.au/reporter</u> or on the MyPestGuide Reporter app.

You can help prevent the spread of this and other aquatic pest plants or animals by ensuring any unwanted pond or aquarium contents are disposed of appropriately and not into any wetland, waterway, stormwater drain or bushland.

Where Are They Now... And Their Contributions to the Community - Part 2 - Continues on page 24

The question is often asked "I wonder where.....is now?" after a long-term local resident is no longer seen at the local shops or has gone into hospital for acute care and has never returned to his or her home.

The following is a little bit about the contribution and life of former Gingin residents and where they are living now.

Margaret Mighall

Margaret lived in Weld Street, having



moved there with her husband Des in 1995. However, they arrived in the district in 1985, living initially in the localities of Wannamal and Beermullah, prior to which they ran a business in Calingiri.

Margaret was a quiet homemaker who loved her garden, books and poetry. She had a remarkable memory and could readily recite the poems learned during school days – particularly those of Banjo Patterson.

Margaret and Des were both members of the local Lions Club and St. John Ambulance and acted as phone despatchers for Ambulance call outs.

Regretfully in the later years of Margaret's life, her eyesight began to deteriorate, and she no longer could drive – which meant she was more confined to her home and garden, other than when taken on outings by her family and community groups.

Son Michael and his partner Debbie live

in Gingin and were of great assistance to Margaret, and along with "home care", Margaret was able to stay in her beloved home despite increasing frailty. Following a period of time in hospital due to a series of falls and general ill health, Margaret and her family, decided she needed access to 24-hour onsite assistance if required.

Margaret now lives in **Buckley Care Centre, part of the Amaroo Home Group in Gosnells,** which is in easy travelling distance of one of her daughters.

Margaret celebrated her 90th birthday in June this year with many of her family at a venue in Darlington. She would welcome contact from her former Gingin friends.

(Interestingly the Mighall and Vallentine families had a 75-year connection through Des and Russ Vallentine playing hockey together in their younger days, and the contact and friendship remained over the years).

Norma Gray

Norma needs no introduction to Gingin. She



was born in 1924 and has lived her whole life in Beermullah, Bindoon and latterly in Gingin. She moved back to Gingin in 2002 following the death of her husband Cyril and the sale of the family farm in Bin-

doon, living initially in Fewster Street. Norma has always been involved in the community by way of her sporting prowess – she was a champion golfer and was made a Life Member of the Gingin Golf Club – and was a very good lawn bowler. In her early 90's she took up croquet and was a very handy croquet player, despite starting to struggle with her eyesight.

Norma was a keen gardener and cook and she combined both these skills in the form of fund raisers. Her morning teas and garden parties were hugely successful and over the years she raised thousands of dollars for the Royal Flying Doctor Service, the Heart Foundation and the Cancer Council. She also contributed to many local causes, inclusive of paying for the cost and laying of a plaque to mark the location of the Beermullah School, and more recently the growing of daffodils in pots that were sold at a street stall in September. The monies raised were donated for use by the Breakfast Club at the local High School.

Regretfully, Norma's ongoing failing eyesight meant living on her own was becoming increasingly problematic and she shifted into private accommodation within the town for a period of time as of late last year. However, she kept up a lively interest in gardening through her pot plants and reinvigorating several of the raised beds in the Gingin Community Garden with the help of a local resident. Norma did much of the work – digging, planting, weeding and finally harvesting.

Norma has a very practical turn of mind and everything she did had to be of use and value. "Normas Patch" was no different.

In 2018, Norma was awarded Gingin's "Senior Citizen of the Year" and an Oral History, and a Biography of her Life have been published and both can be found in the local library.

Norma has been marvellously supported throughout these last few years by the local community and her extended family. She has been able to benefit from the Community Car, and local friends have read to her and prepared meals for her. Norma is not only practical but organized – and she has been determined to be ready for her Centenary Birthday Celebrations in 2024 – she has booked the Hall, prepared the guest list, organized and booked the menu and caterer and has started to make some of the table decorations.

Regretfully, despite Norma's determination to be fully independent, her failing eyesight created increasing problems with scrapes and grazes and the potential for serious falls. This has meant the need for daily support for general care through a part time carer, friends and family.

A recent severe chest infection meant a trip to hospital and following some five weeks in hospital and in discussion with all involved, Norma transferred from hospital to "live in" assisted care.

Currently she is living at **Aegis Care Home** in **Bayswater.** This is interim accommodation until a permanent home has been finalized. Norma's son lives in the northern suburbs, and it is hoped she will relocate closer to him. Norma also has grandchildren, great grandchildren and members of her extended family living in the metropolitan area. Norma is contactable by phone and visitors are welcome, or she can be taken for outings as she wishes.

Local friends are already visiting her – and have remarked she is enjoying the good food, and its preparation continues to be high on Norma's list of priorities, as it has been throughout her life.



There is no consistent policy for all the Homes. In general, mandatory Covid vaccination is not required, but this is not the case for the "Flu" vaccine. Obviously, you should not be visiting if you are unwell.

Where there is "Covid" within the Home this will be clearly stated – posted on a Flyer to the Entrance Door, through a Social Media format or with phone contact. Some organizations have a complete Lock Down policy if there is Covid amongst its residents, others are more flexible. The latter, if you wish to continue with the visit, are likely to ask visitors to wear a mask and other protective clothing within the building, irrespective of whether the person you are visiting has Covid.

However, this does not prevent you from maintaining contact. Many care homes have independent phone connections available within the bedrooms, or have a handset that can be taken to, and used by the resident, or the resident may have use of their own mobile phone.

Past Gingin News

Mr Norman Fewster was a very well-known and respected member of the Gingin community who during his lifetime, kept a journal of his day-to-day pursuits and was very much interested in our area's history. On the 30 May 1979 he was made an Honorary Freeman of the Municipality of the Shire of Gingin. Very few residents have been given this honour. Mr Fewster served a total of 32 years 5 months on the Gingin Roads Board which later became the Gingin Shire Council. Within that period of service, he was President for 16. Mr Fewster passed away in 1997.

Mr Fewster, it feels wrong to say Norman, wrote a book "Muchea Memories" and contributed articles to the Gingin News in the 1980's. The articles, that I am aware of, have never been published beyond the "News".

With the permission of his eldest son Mr Max Fewster, the "Buzz" will reproduce these articles that give insights to life in Gingin from times gone by.

The article in this edition is based on his reminiscing of the community's involvement at Bambun Lake.

Gingin News – Edition No: 28 December 1986

BAMBUN LAKE by N. T. FEWSTER

Summer is once more upon us and when the real hot days come, my mind turns back to Bambun Lake and the pleasure it gave to so many people from Muchea, Bindoon, Gingin and Mooliabeenee in the Nineteen Twenty and Thirty eras.

There are now very few people living in the Gingin Shire that have seen the Lake or know very much about it.

Situated about six miles south of the town and off the Brand Highway between Gingin and Muchea - you will see the sign Bambun Road (No Through Road).

In those early days a cart track was cleared and situated on the side of the Lake was an old homestead. This particular area was selected in the early development of our district.

My first memories of this place were the ruins of the old building and a big fig tree growing nearby. On the tree there were hundreds of initials carved on the trunk and larger branches. Names of many of the early settlers who came there to get a bag of wild ducks. They were in their hundreds – along with the many other birds who had made the Lake their home. There were swans, ibis, brown birds known as bitterns, waterfowl, dab chicks and the shags. This lake always seemed to have an abundance of food for these birds.

The fish that were caught in the Lake were two varieties – cobble and carp – these pink and brown fish were introduced by some of the earlier settlers.

Mr McKenzie of *Muchea* may have been responsible for them being there because in the early days in that district, he endeavoured to establish a small fish breeding farm, but with very little success. Lake Chandala was also full of these fish.

Bambun Lake itself was oval in shape – the area of water would have covered approximately 130 acres with a dense thicket of paper bark trees, especially on the norther part of the Lake where the water from the Lennards Brook ran into it. This Brook that we see when we cross the bridge two miles south of Gingin entered the Lake on the North-Eastern side and the overflow water made its get-away on the North-West side, running towards the Gingin Brook and joining up where the Nolan Homestead is, now owned by Mr Hugh Harris.

Most of the perimeter of this Lake was sur-

rounded by a thicket of paper bark trees, Bluegums a little further away, but on the northern end of the Lake, there was a jungle! An area of about 20 acres, similar to our Scenic Walk named after Jim Gordon VC. The paper barks were of all shapes and sizes, and when My brother and I tried to walk around the Lake, we had to climb along these trees and through their branches.

The water was fresh, good stock water, but very brown in colour, similar to the water at the Scenic Pool but it was a great place to cool off in the hot days of summer. New Years Day was the big event of the year families came from surrounding districts to jo join in Trucks, Cars, fully loaded horse and carts and some on horseback. A few of us locals, together with the storekeeper Mr Cyril Riley organised transport, a supply of soft drinks and containers of ice-cream.

Ice-cream came up on the Railway in heavy metal containers holding about three gallons. These containers were packed in canvas bags full of ice and straw. When we reached Bambun Lake, the ice-cream containers and many bottles of soft drink were placed in the old fashioned bathtubs full of large pieces of ice – some of the hundredweight that was taken to the lake.

When all families were settled down for lunch, an announcement would come over Mr Oscar Dewar's loudspeaker system that ice-cream, (which I might add was a luxury item in those days) was available. A liberal supply was rationed out to each family for five shillings. Ice-cream and soft drinks were only sold to defray expenses and any drinks that were left over, Mr Riley would take back to his shop – these items made the picnic a little bit special.

Mr Oscar Dewar also brought down his record player and lot of the old favourite songs, popular at the time, were enjoyed along with swimming, diving, cricket, rounder and the day always finished with a variety of foot races, sack races, three-legged race and in order to provide some small cash prizes for the children, quite a generous amount of money was thrown into a container by the spectators. It was yearly event enjoyed by young and old with very little organising.

During the many heatwaves in summer, many families from Gingin found their way down to the Lake for a cool off. Our truck used to leave about six o'clock – all families taking their tea and a couple of pleasant hours were spent at the Lake.

As the roads in the district improved and better cars arrived, the Moore River, now called Guilderton, seemed a lot closer and people moved out there for their fishing and swimming and the old Bambun Lake became less popular.

"Bambun Lake - History

The first land surveyed near Gingin was SL 96 of 643 acres. This was a series of zigzagging blocks up along Lennard's Brook and was selected by E.B. Lennard in 1831, who never used the land. In 1853, 10 acres, being SL135 on the east side of Bambun Lake, was granted to Robert J. Brockman. He is believed to have built a mud bat house and lived there with his family. It was originally a beautiful lake with a little sandy beach and plenty of green grass and shady trees. It was a favourite place for picnics and sports meetings for Gingin people during the years 1900 to the 1950's. A boating accident occurred in January 1910 when a punt capsized, and a young woman drowned. Efforts by the Local Authority to resume land on the eastern side of the Lake for public recreation have always failed. It is not accessible to the public. A reserve, R22831, does not reach the lakeside."

Know your rechargeable battery risks

.......

If you have a mobile phone, laptop, electric toothbrush, e-scooter, e-bike, any power tools, or solar power backup storage, you need to know how to reduce potentially deadly fire risks lurking in their batteries.

These common household items use rechargeable lithium-ion batteries which can be highly flammable. If these batteries are used incorrectly, or are damaged, they can overheat, explode and cause fires that can be dangerous and difficult to extinguish.

House fires, burns, chemical exposure, smoke inhalation and property damage have all been reported in connection with lithium-ion battery charging. The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) saw a 92% increase in reported lithium-ion battery-related incidents in 2022 compared to 2020.


But you can take simple steps to reduce the risks, such as only using the charger recommended for the battery, unplugging products when they're fully charged, and charging batteries in a cool and dry place out of direct sunlight and away from combustible materials like beds, lounges or carpets.

If your batteries overheat, appear to be swelling, or leak or vent gas, stop using them immediately, and never use damaged charging cables.

Disposal of these batteries also poses problems because the batteries can catch fire if they're crushed, or exposed to heat or moisture in rubbish trucks, household rubbish, or waste facilities. <u>Recycle Right at recycleright.wa.gov.au</u> can help you find your closest drop-off point to dispose of lithium-ion batteries safely.

Lithium-ion batteries play a vital role in helping to achieve Australia's transition to net zero emissions. But the safety of those using these batteries is paramount. The ACCC is recommending national regulations around testing, labelling and storage of these batteries to better protect consumers.

Shut the door on real estate and rental scammers

Buying or renting a residential property involves significant financial transactions which, increasingly, are targets for scammers.

Over the last 12 month, WA ScamNet received 129 complaints of real estate and rental scams that left 74 West Australians almost one million dollars, in total, out of pocket.

Rental and real estate scammers try to trick you out of your money when you need to transfer payments or make deposits to banks, real estate & settlement agents or landlords.

Real estate scammers often impersonate businesses, such as a settlement agent or bank, by using an email address similar to the real one. They can redirect your payments into their fraudulent accounts by persuading you to download software that gives them access to your computer, or by obtaining a one-time bank verification code from you, enabling your payment to be 're-directed' – to the scammer.

Rental scammers often advertise scam properties on Gumtree or Facebook that feature appealing property photographs. They give you an address to drive by the property, but make excuses about why you can't go inside for an inspection. They then ask you for a bond or rent payment upfront, when that advertised property might already be rented, up for sale, or not even exist.

Retrieving your money paid to fraudulent accounts is difficult, so stay alert to prevent being scammed. If you're buying property, never provide a verification code for your bank account to someone over the phone, always call your settlement agent or bank to confirm details before transferring or paying money, and never give anyone remote access to your computer.

You can outsmart rental scammers by dealing only with landlords or licenced real estate property managers who you can meet in-person, inspecting properties before signing any agreements or paying any money, and requiring a copy of the signed lease agreement, and the property's keys, in exchange for any money you agree to pay.

If you suspect a real estate or rental scam, let WA ScamNet know by calling 1300 30 40 54 or via the <u>website</u> at <u>www.scamnet.wa.gov.au</u>, where you can also sign up for alerts to keep informed about current scams.

If you've suffered financial loss from a scam, be vigilant for 'follow up' scams where scammers pretend to be online investigators wanting to retrieve your stolen money for a fee.

"Dad!"


It was Lacie. I ran over to her, and gave her a huge hug.

Keep your Christmas cheer in check

The pressures and temptations to spend too much over Christmas can create financial stress and debt that linger long after the Christmas cheer has gone.

Despite increasing costs of living, including higher mortgage interest rates, a report by Australian Consumer and Retail Studies at Monash Business School shows people are planning to spend an average of \$1,088 on Christmas presents, with 65 per cent intending to spend a further \$370 at post-Christmas sales

The report reveals that people are budgeting to spend 40 per cent more for electronics compared to last year, and 16 per cent more for household goods, clothing, footwear and accessories.

Consumer Protection says there are ways to spend wisely to avoid a post-Christmas credit crunch, including sticking to a strict budget, and buying direct from shops, rather than paying extra for postal or delivery fees for online purchases.

Be careful if you choose to use 'buy now, pay later' schemes which allow payment by instalments, instead of paying the full amount upfront. These schemes enable fast and easy purchases, and prove popular around Christmas time, but repayments can add up for multiple purchases, or for late payments and account-keeping fees.

The <u>Moneysmart website</u> offers helpful tips to manage a 'buy now, pay later' service, including:

Ensure repayments suit your budget and financial commitments.

- Link your 'buy now, pay later' account to your debit card instead of your credit card so you use your own money and avoid extra debts or interest.
- Set and stick to a spending limit, and only have one 'buy now, pay later' at a time. Contact your provider immediately if you're having trouble making repayments.

Financial stress is affecting more and more Australians, with 130,000 calls received by the National Debt Helpline annually. The Government is boosting access to financial counselling by requiring the big banks and financial services industry, including the buy now, pay later sector and gambling outlets, to contribute \$30 million over the next three years to enable more Australians to get help to manage their debts.



All the Christmas trappings

The 2023-24 season has started!

In time for Christmas, a 3000+ trap array has been set across Perth and regional sites in WA. Their purpose? To detect the invasive European wasp (Vespula germanica); one of the world's worst insect pests

These gluttonous wasps swarm picnics, parties cafés, and breweries, feeding on all things; drinks, sweets, and savories. Watch them close enough and you'll see their jaws skilfully carve a piece from your meal and take it to go. This behaviour makes them unique amongst wasp species and a social nuisance and safety concern.

European wasps also forage on fruit crops impacting home gardeners and commercial producers, and their predation of insects can impact local biodiversity and beehives. When it comes to destructive pests, they take the cake.

The Department-lead European wasp surveillance and eradication program, has to date, prevented the permanent establishment of this species. However, every year fertilised queens hitchhike into WA on vehicles or in freight and cargo from interstate. If undetected, they will leave their mode of transport and make a nest, which is predominantly underground

Manually searching for a nest, is like looking for a needle in a havstack. The traps help us locate where in this haystack we need to look

The traps are simple, but cleverly designed. Composed of a clear plastic, lidded jar, wire hook, a vellow label, and four specially designed yellow cones. A trap typically adorns a tree, and the decorative yellow appeals to the wasp, drawing them to the cones. The cones funnel the wasp inside and make it difficult to escape.

Capitalising on the wasps' unique attraction to protein, present inside the trap is a small cube of raw fish. It's this fish that lures the wasp to the trap. a trap doesn't contain the fish, it's just a plastic ornament

Traps are strategically placed in the highest risk areas of the state by surveillance staff or hung in home gardens, parks or schools by community or government participants of the 'Adopt-a-trap' program. If diligently lured with fish (fortnightly) and checked for wasps, we'll detect them, find them, and eradicate them.
