

#### **Heartfelt Thanks for Bushfire Efforts**

The Shire of Gingin would like to thank and acknowledge the efforts of everyone involved in containing the recent Gingin-Bindoon fires.

"On behalf of the Shire I'd like to express our heartfelt thanks to everyone involved in the recent fire containment efforts at Gingin and Bindoon," said Shire President Wayne Fewster. "Unfortunately, two houses and nine outbuildings were lost, several others were damaged, and 5,500 hectares were burnt, however 54 homes were saved thanks to the joint efforts of many individuals and agencies.

"We are extremely thankful for the support of DFES, SES, Dept of Biodiversity, Conservation & Attractions, WA Police, St John Ambulance, Dept of Communities, Western Power, and all other agencies who were involved in this incident.

"The Shire of Gingin has a close working relationship with Metro North Coastal region of DFES with fire management issues particularly, and the professionalism of the DFES team and all the other support agencies was integral to the successful containment of and recovery from the fires.

"I would like to extend our deepest thanks to all the incredible local and regional volunteer bush fire brigade members and Volunteer Fire and Rescue teams who came from all over the State and bravely attended the fires in very trying conditions. Your efforts are appreciated more than words can express."

The Shire would also like to praise the way in which the whole community responded to the emergency.

"Our thanks also go out to the private contractors who provided heavy machinery and water carting to assist with the firefighting, and the local businesses and community groups who all played a crucial role in helping our towns to get through the bushfire emergency and recovery process. We cannot thank you enough.

"Our thoughts continue to be with everyone who lost homes and property, and the Shire is committed to doing what we can to assist with recovery."

The Shire would like to remind everyone that there are still a few more months of unpredictable dry, hot weather ahead and to be vigilant with keeping your properties and townsites fire safe, particularly with maintaining firebreaks.

# Gingin Brook Catchment Group

Do you know February 12<sup>th</sup> is International Darwin Day?

Darwin Day is a celebration to commemorate the birthday of Charles Darwin on 12 February 1809. The day is used to highlight Darwin's contributions to science and to promote science in general. Darwin Day started in the United States in the 1980s and is now celebrated world-wide.

Charles Darwin was an **English** naturalist, geologist & biologist. He sailed on the second voyage of the "Beagle" leaving Plymouth in December for South America with his primary role geologist. Extensive as surveys of the geology were carried out but Darwin also studied and collected plants and animals. On the Galapagos Islands Darwin noted the unique plants and animals on the islands. He was particularly interested in the finches and made detailed studies of the differences in the beaks of birds from different islands in the group. This was the initial inspiration for his theory of evolution by natural selection.

After completing their work in South America, the ship headed for home via New Zealand, Sydney, Van Dieman's Land (Tasmania) and King George Sound (Albany). In Australia he saw other unusual plants and animals which added to his interest in natural selection as a theory of evolution. On his return to England in October 1836 he arranged to have his collected specimens classified by experts. His journal from the "Beagle" voyage was his first publication in 1839.

Following further research, in 1859 his book "On the Origin of Species" was published. In 1871 he published "The Descent of Man" which discussed the evolution of the human race. He also published and wrote several other books

including about insectivorous plants, cross and self-fertilisation in vegetables, and movement in plants.

At the time of his death in April 1882, although most scientist were convinced of evolution, many did not agree that natural selection was the main means of modification. He was buried at Westminster Abbey after public and parliamentary petitioning instigated by his colleagues. His funeral was attended by thousands of people.

Darwin is commemorated in Australia by Darwin Harbour. It was named after him by a former shipmate who sailed with him on the second voyage of "HMS Beagle" and was also on the "Beagle" on its third voyage, which visited northern Australia in 1839.

In Western Australia Charles Darwin Reserve is named after him. This was formerly known as White Wells Station and after the lease was returned to the State, the property was purchased in 2003 by Bush Heritage Australia with the aid of a large donation from Chris Darwin, Charles Darwin's great great grandson. The reserve is 68,600 Ha and is located about 60km west of Perenjori between Wubin and Paynes Find. It straddles the Southwest and the Eremaean botanical provinces and is home to 230 animal and over 680 plant species and is managed for conservation.

I encourage everyone to grow and share. Happy Gardening,



lesions unchecked and our hope all was resolved for them.



# Past Gingin News

# Gingin News - December 1987 Issue No:31

Thoroughbred Sales at Gingin in the 1930's by Mr Norman Fewster.

For as long as I can remember, Gingin has been able to produce good riding horses and there are many stories told of what these horses meant to our early settlers in times of emergency. Perhaps one day I will record the ride Mr Hughie King made from the Junction to Guildford to get medical aid for a member of his family.

Early in the century, a Turf Club was formed at Gingin and the Club set about developing a Race Course which was used for many years. Following the establishment of the racetrack at Gingin, clubs were also formed at Bindoon and Muchea. So a lot of top racing horses were bred from around the Gingin area.

the 1920's, the lovely old During property of Cheriton changed hands, with Mr and Mrs Fred Farquahar being the new owners. Fred carried on with the raising of beef cattle and fat lambs, but we were soon to see some well-bred horses running on his He then purchased irrigated flats. stallion thoroughbred named "Olympion" and later on another called "Camel Hair". Very soon, horse breeding grew from being a sideline to playing a major part in the running of Cheriton.

There were three children in the Farquahar family. Their son Bob, took very little interest in the horses and worked mainly with the cattle and sheep, but the two daughters, Mary and Pat, were great lovers of horses and took over the management of the thoroughbred stock.

After a few years of selling their horses through ordinary channels, Mr Farquahar decided to run his own sale at Cheriton. The sale was generally held in April and a lot of preparation and thought was put into it. The horse stables and yards were

situated to the back of the two-storey house, but Fred decided that the actual sale would be on one of the big lawns at the front of the house.

The round sale ring was quite a size. Posts were used, well roped in and on one end a platform was raised for the Auctioneer and his staff (there were no loudspeakers in those days). At the other end a small, raised seating area like a miniature grandstand was erected. This was used as seating for the buyers. Around the ring, near the enclosure, bags of chaff were placed for seating and the rest of the crowd sat or stood wherever they could, as the sale always brought a crowd of people from far and wide, including Moora and Toodyay. However, most buyers came from the Metropolitan Area. Most of the Gingin folk came for a good day out and to see the great prices paid for these thoroughbreds.

The sale commenced at 2.00pm and the horses were brought down by one of the stable hands at approximately six minute intervals. The yearlings were then handed to Pat or Mary Farquahar, led into the ring and paraded in front of the buyers.

After the Auctioneer had given all the details of the animal's breeding, the bidding commenced. Four of five hundred guineas was considered a good price, but I can remember that at one sale an outstanding yearling brought the price of 1,000 guineas.

The sale would usually end at about 4.00pm, when afternoon tea was served. The Gingin P&C at that time needed finance and Mr Farquahar paid them a good price to cater for the event.

The sales were carried on for a number of years, until the property was sold. However, even today it still produces some great thoroughbreds.

(NOTE: A guinea in Australia pre decimalisation was worth 1 pound 1 shilling or £1-1s-0d or £1/1/-)

But where there are curds, there is always whey..... the runny bit.

When it is all over, there needs to be tears, personal withdrawal, outbursts of anger, someone "not being themselves", lack of concentration, "weakness", all sorts of things that are not the smooth creamy substance of normal heat.

We all need to recognise that this is normal after extreme heat and be patient with others and ourselves.

We got through it. Our community is strong as we pull together. We don't need criticism and negativity to sour the aftermath. Look after each other and ourselves, and we will be all the stronger for this horror experience.

Please don't suffer in silence and alone. If is tough, let someone know. There are many people in this community willing to lend a hand. We just need to know one is needed!!!!!

#### Protocols for Public Statement Time Trial

Commencing at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 20 February 2024, Council will trial the inclusion of Public Statement Time at Council meetings.

Currently all Council meetings include provisions for Public Question Time, which is a requirement under the Local Government Act 1995. However Public Question Time is reserved for questions only and does not allow for members of the public to make statements on matters of interest unless they are a brief preface to provide context to a question. For that reason, Council has agreed to include a period of time for public statements at Council meetings on a trial basis.

Protocols have been established for Public Statement Time and these are available on the Council Meetings page of the Shire's website.

#### Advice for Pet Owners - Dead Blowfish on Beaches

DPIRD has advised that high temperatures, low tides, shallow water, and decomposing sea wrack may have resulted in low dissolved oxygen levels, leading to blowfish deaths on local beaches within the Shire.

Pet owners should take particular care to prevent pets from eating the washed-up blowfish. Blowfish toxicity can be life-threatening to pets, therefore immediate veterinary attention should be sought if you notice your pet having contact with or eating a blowfish.

Please immediately report fish kills to DPIRD via the FishWatch 24/7



#### Firebreak Maintenance Reminder

In view of the recent fires throughout the Shire, property owners are reminded that firebreaks need to be maintained until 31 May annually as per the Shire's Firebreak Orders.

During the busy summer months, it is essential to keep an eye on your firebreaks and continue maintaining them throughout the hot, dry months of the Prohibited and Restricted Burning Periods.

If you need assistance with maintaining your firebreaks, you can find a list of firebreak contractors in your Fire Break Orders which were posted out with your Rates in October 2023. Alternatively, you can download a copy from our website gingin.wa.gov.au.





# CU@ PARK TEMPORARY CLOSURE



# Footprints in the Snow Alan Gent

"When I was small, and Christmas trees were tall..."

I really liked being the first one out in the snow. I'd take a detour on my way to school just so that I could leave those deep footprints in the snow across the field. I could look right back and see where I'd come from, and I was the only one! I could make believe that I was the only person in the whole world. Sometimes, if I was late, somebody else had beaten me to it, and it wasn't the same. Mum couldn't understand my hurry to get to school just after an overnight snow fall. The snow would make a crunching sound under my wellingtons, and I'd lift my feet up high so that the impressions were just my feet.

I suppose that these days there would be all sorts of worries about little boys walking alone to school, but the world seemed more innocent then, and those were happy times.

One sunny winter morning I'd rushed out to the fresh snow-laden landscape, crunched down the path and all the way to the end of the road before I saw other prints. It didn't worry me; most of the other children would walk to school a different way, and didn't get the singular honour of being the first across the field. I headed straight for the gap in the fence and was most dismayed to see another set of prints all the way across the field to the fence the other side where I would exactly have gone. Despite mγ disappointment, intrigued. I tried my boots in the prints. They were smaller than mine, and I continued across the field claiming some sort of victory as I placed my boots in exactly the same holes in the snow. I wondered who this small-footed trespasser was.

When I got to school, and old Mr. Baldock, the 'lollypop man' in modern day parlance, had seen me across the road, I joined

the other boys and girls in the cloakroom hanging up our winter garb and changing out of our boots.

There was a bit of a commotion because a new pupil had started school and there was the usual fuss to sort out 'friends' of the new person. It wasn't a large school, and we soon dispersed to our various classes. It was assembly first, being a Monday, and we had prayers, a hymn, and the Headmistress told us all the news and welcomed us back from the weekend. Then she said: "Now we have a very special announcement. We have a new pupil! Some of you have met her already. I want all of you to make her really welcome. Her name is Elizabeth, but she likes to be called 'Liz".

We were then dismissed. My first class was English, with Miss Farrington. The new girl, Liz, was there. When she smiled at me, I had that weird sensation of falling, and somehow the room seemed to light up. I had a dry taste in my mouth that felt like sandpaper. If I tried to speak, I know I couldn't. When she looked at me, I just knew she could see how I felt.

I suppose I hit it off with Liz from that first class. I found that she liked to walk in the snow just after the first winter fall, as I did, and that it was her little feet that had 'trespassed' special on my Suddenly it didn't matter. We walked to school together every day, the snow turned to slush, the Sun came up earlier, and Summer came around. I helped her with her arithmetic and she helped me with my English. We went on long walks together in the brilliant sunshine, and sometimes under umbrellas in the pouring rain. It was idyllic.

Of course, all good things come to an end, as they say, but when you're young it doesn't seem possible. One day, as we walked to school, she seemed very quiet, and I asked her what was wrong. When she turned to look at me, I could see she'd been crying. "It's Dad," she said, "He's got a new job in Leeds and we're having to move."

"I was crestfallen, to say the least. "When?" I asked. "In about two weeks. We're only renting our house, so he can start his new job next month."

We walked on, and I couldn't find anything to say. Then: "Will you write to me? We can still keep in touch, can't we?" "Of course," she said, "maybe we can phone..."

So that was it. Liz moved. I tried harder in English and arithmetic, and got really good results. I went to a Grammar school. Liz wrote long letters at first, and I wrote back. Then the letters seemed longer coming. Then Liz told me about this really nice boy she'd met in Leeds, that said he was going to be a Mechanical Engineer. Finally, we lost touch completely, and my letters bore the message: "Return to Sender".

I went from Grammar school to university and managed to get a first-class Honours degree in Physics. I met girls, of course, and had a good time, but I never forgot Liz and the way she smiled at me. I tried to find her face in every girl I met. Later I got onto social websites in case I could find her there. I never really gave up until I got married to a wonderful girl. We had children, I lectured at the University where I got my degree and studied for a PhD. The children grew up, and my wife Shay and I were very proud of them. Then, even this good thing came to an end. Shay contracted cancer and died quite suddenly about three weeks after the diagnosis. Our three children came to the funeral with their wives all but Charlie, who never married. Life went on.

I accepted a Principal Lecturing job at Edinburgh University. I'd been there three weeks when the first snow fell. I saw the fresh, new landscape, and something told me I just had to be the first! People probably thought I was silly walking through the park, lifting my feet up high. I didn't care.

Suddenly, cutting across my path I saw fresh tracks, smaller than mine. Once again, something whispered to me that I had to follow them, so I did. I was back in the field

as a little boy again, a growing feeling of excitement creeping over me almost the as ran in prints. I was so engrossed in other making my feet land in the right place I ran headlong into a very attractive woman who'd stopped and was staring in my direction. We both tumbled over in the snow.

"I'm so terribly sorry." I said, "You must think I'm an idiot!" I helped her up and she just stood there with her mouth open. She smiled.


I don't know why these things happen. Perhaps our destinies are written by some unforeseen entity and we really don't have much choice in the matter. The fact is, my mouth went dry, like sandpaper, the winter Sun shone brighter, and Liz and I stood hugging one another for long minutes.

We both started talking at once. She told me she was no longer married, that her husband had 'not been very nice' and that she had been living in Edinburgh for only three days. She also had a teaching job at one of the big High schools teaching mathematics. She said the help I gave her at Primary school was what sparked her interest.

The rest, as they say, is history. Liz and I are once again inseparable. We got married within a month of that first meeting and our collective five children came to the wedding. We bought a little cottage just outside the city and have a wonderful life together. We never discussed why we lost touch with one another. I suppose we were both young and recognised that life had to go on in some form.

We both enjoy walking together after the first snow fall of winter, with our two pairs of feet making those deep footprints in the snow.
