# Front Page Story Norma Gray turns 100!!

# Congratulations Norma Gray – A Party for the Centenary.

A magical afternoon and evening were had by all to congratulate and celebrate one hundred years of life for "our" Norma Gray at the Granville Hall on February 24.

Commencing at 3.30 pm and going well into the night, it was an event that will be long recalled as a spectacular occasion.

Not many people can say their Birthday was attended by two Freeman of the Shire of Gingin, 5 former Councillors and one currently serving Shire President and with family and friends travelling from the Northern Territory, the ACT, Queensland and many parts of Western Australia and locally. In total there were approximately 150 guests in attendance.

Norma is of the generation that believes occasions and things don't "just happen by luck but by good management", so in mid-2023, she set about organizing her significant day, her way.

She booked the Granville Civic Centre, discussed her menu with her chosen Caterer, with a speculative number of 160 guests, drew up a list of guests for a mail out of invitations, booked the local Florist and chose the colour theme for the flowers and decorations, decided on what music she would like to have and who was to play and the format of the night.

The function was to be held on a weekend in order that it would not clash with interstate travellers, or those who were working. Important also was to choose the right person to make the evening flow smoothly – the Master of Ceremonies. Finally, the Dress Code was to be formal, and the meal sit down served by "wait staff" with an Entree, Hot Roast Meal, Dessert and Birthday Cake to follow. So much for this sound and early preparation by Norma – but the "fickle finger of fate" was not going to let all go to Norma's original plan!

It is difficult to organize a grand event by remote control and with the relocation of Norma to assisted residential care in Perth in December last year, the organization of her party started to become problematic, through the tyranny of distance and "communication hiccoughs".

The invitations were delayed in arriving and some were misaddressed. By mid-January it was clear to all something was seriously wrong. The question was being asked – "Have you got an invitation to Norma's Birthday?"

Then in stepped one of the two "Fairy Godparents" - Taryn Harris, Norma's Great niece. With perseverance and determination, she networked tirelessly over the last few weeks before the set date to obtain a comprehensive list of all those Norma wished to invite to her special day. However, each time someone spoke to Norma she would mention yet another person she had forgotten to ask!!

In the end, an amended RSVP date was decided upon, and many invitations would ultimately be received by word of mouth. (Sadly a few people were unable to attend, as by this late stage they had previous commitments.)



Taryn is also to be congratulated for bringing together the colour scheme of blue and gold with wall banners, streamers, balloons and lights throughout the Hall.

The uncertainty surrounding the guest list was making it difficult for Caterer Selga to plan quantities of food, wait staff and how to fulfill Normas original menu. The question arose – a smorgasbord Norma? "No, I want a sit-down meal!" was her response.

Delays in knowing the acceptance numbers also flowed to the setting up of the Hall - the number of tables and the configuration of these tables within the Hall, with the Florist Sylvia being in a quandary on the colour scheme for the table decorations and major arrangements – finding blue and gold flowers is not an easy task at the best of times – but this was Norma's wish.

Norma's invitations had become the most talked about "item" of the year. Potential tickets to Taylor Swift, or an Eagles vs Dockers Grand finale have nothing on the conversation around these invites. Who was going, what was happening, who was setting up the Hall, how many will be there, what about the music – the speculation was endless within the town.

The other Fairy Godparent to step in was the "Collective of Team Gingin", consisting of members of the Gingin Carers Group, and individual people who over many years had been involved with Norma through sport, book reading, outings, or just chatting to her in the street.

A fortnight before the event, a small group of Norma's nieces and nephews, and Team Gingin met at the Hall to plan decorations, format and layout – given that numbers attending were still somewhat "rubbery".

On the day preceding the event, the 23 February, "Team Gingin", Team Chitty and the Master of Ceremonies, under the direction of Team Leader, Taryn, came together in full force, setting up and decorating the Hall, and to discuss the format of the afternoon and evening, with a further tweaking on the morning of the party – D-Day/Norma's Day!!



All good, but the Lady luck had three more cards to play – Caterer Selga arrived, having been advised two wait staff were not available, there was no power to the ovens to cook the all-important roast meat and a major Bowls Tournament, which had not been factored into the original plans – would be affecting guest attendance.

Fortunately, at the crucial moment when it was being decided an alternative venue may be required to cook the all-important meal, a White Knight arrived in the form of Shire President, Wayne Fewster, who managed an "alternative arrangement" for power and the show was on the road.

And what as show!!!!

Norma arrived at 3.00pm for family photos. A professional photographer had been engaged and was there throughout the night for group and individual photos – organized by daughter Anne, who also was responsible for the safe arrival of a beautiful Birthday Cake. Background music was provided by a series of performances by Rob Arthur and Francis White on piano, Ray on piano accordion, a group of Vanuatuan farm workers who sang a selection of songs in English and Creole and a compilation of music provided by granddaughter Katherine and from Fewster Band tapes. A "grazing table" enabled people to mingle in the early part of the gathering – and what mingling took place. Norma looked resplendent in a beautiful dress and greeted all her guests with much laughter and a few tears. No event can be without a tiara, a sash and a throne – this was her night of nights.

The guests all queued to wish Norma Happy Birthday, some having not been directly involved with her for years – and as they waited, they in turn, also met with other fellow guests they may not have seen for 50 years or more and these reconnections continued throughout the night.

At 5.30pm Master of Ceremonies, Robert Brodie–Hall, called everyone to order with the usual housekeeping announcements and the planned format for the evening. Following this he outlined significant and interesting moments of Norma's life, which he described at the end as "This is Your Life Norma". These words were interspersed with music, a presentation of flowers and a speech on behalf of the Shires of Gingin and Chittering from Shire President Wayne Fewster and a recollection of some events in Norma's life by her younger sister Dot Chitty, keeping us all entertained.

Rob, Robert, Brodie, or Brodie-Hall included a delightful poem on Aging, then concluded the formal part of the evening by calling upon all in attendance to sing Happy Birthday to Norma, followed by a rousing Three Cheers and cutting of the Birthday Cake.

Norma in her response to the occasion and who is not usually short of words, decided on this occasion that "less is more" thanking everyone for coming and to those "behind the scenes" who had put the evening together. As she said, "In naming a few persons she would miss out on many – Thank you to all."

It was time for her to take to the floor for the first dance of the night with her nephew, Stephen Chitty, others followed including some of her great grandchildren and nieces to show us their moves – not strictly ballroom - but they were up on the floor for the occasion.

It was a memorable night to thank her, to honour her and congratulate her on her memorable life.

On Tuesday 27 February, there was another celebration at Madeley Brightwater – with a coming together of friends and family for more food, singing around the piano with the City of Wanneroo Mayor, Linda Aitken and presentations of Congratulatory Cards and messages from the King and Queen, the Governor General of Australia, the Governor of Western Australia, the Prime Minister of Australia and the Premier of W.A. and her local member of Parliament. As niece-in-law, Colleen Harris said, Norma was in top form and loved every minute of this second time round to celebrate her day on the day.



# **Gingin Brook Catchment Group**

Following a long hot dry summer many plants in local bushland are looking very poorly. If plants in your bush are looking dead don't be too hasty in declaring them so and removing them. Wait to see if they recover over the We are familiar with winter and spring. exotic deciduous trees and shrubs losing their leaves in autumn and reshooting in These become dormant as an spring. adaptation to survive inhospitable winters in their natural range. WA native plants similarly have adaptations to survive the inhospitable periods, in our case the dryness and fires of summer. Although some may be killed and need to re-establish from seed others will survive and reshoot from epicormic buds on the stems, or from the rootstock.

Those of you who saw the December 2023 edition of this publication may remember the report of Amazon Frogbit having been detected in the Gingin Brook in the Neergabby area in November. That occurrence, being only 1 or 2 square metres at that time, has now spread to 1.5 km of the creek line, demonstrating how quickly these water weeds can spread.

Amazon Frogbit (Limnobium laevigatum) is also known as South American Spongeplant due to the sponge-like bulge on the underside of the juvenile leaves. The floating plants produce stolons which develop new plants on the end. The resulting dense mats clog waterways and impact native species, water quality, irrigation equipment and recreational activities. Although generally thought of as a freshwater plant needing sun, research by the South East Regional Centre for Urban Landcare indicates the plants are also able to live in brackish water and when shaded by other plants.

If you find anything you think might be Amazon Frogbit or other aquatic weeds, or any unusual plants you think might be weeds please report them to mypestguide.agric. wa.gov.au/reporter or on the MyPestGuide Reporter app.

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# Past\_Gingin News

Mr Norman Fewster wrote a number of articles that he labelled "The Police Paddock". These writings document the creation of the "Horseshoe" and the people who resided there. Many of them mentioned still have family that reside in the district and contribute to our growing town.

With Mr Fewster's descendants' permission, we include his writings in the next 3 editions of the Buzz.

The Police Paddock articles were spread across several editions of the Gingin News in 1984 and 1985.

#### Gingin News – April 1984 Issue No:20

The "Police Paddock" as remembered by Mr Norman Fewster

There is much to be written about this small choice piece of ground in our Gingin Townsite. I have called it the Police Paddock; others know it as the "Horseshoe" both names are linked with the Gingin Brook.

The term "Police Paddock" is traced back to the early history of Gingin when a very large area of the Midlands, especially north of Gingin was administered by the Police Department from Gingin.

Naturally their work was carried out on horse back and in order to make a suitable paddock, large enough and well-watered, (covering about 300 acres), a post and rail fence was erected across the neck of the horseshoe. The Brook itself was too boggy for horses to cross so a cheap, excellent paddock was created.

olice Paddock* proximately 300 acres for a horses, and shaped very ch like a Horseshoe.

The head of this great stream of water that has made Gingin so productive commences approximately eight miles north of the Gingin Townsite. The Water Shed of this brook is mainly porous sandy country. From the brook source, the hills rise up and surround it on three sides. All the rain that falls is caught as there is no run off and hence it all sinks immediately into the sand and nature releases it in this lovely hollow. From there its millions of gallons of water commence to flow through a rich fertile valley and passing through the Gingin Townsite and then wanders its way out to the sea about 28 miles away - the new name for the mouth of this stream is called Guilderton.

Let me now turn to this piece of land that became known as the "Horseshoe" or "Police Paddock". All the land running from Lefroy Street and Robinson Street to the Brook was sold mainly in five or six acre lots. The high land that lies between those two streets were sold on the 99-year Lease system in approximately two acre blocks they have now been made Freehold.

The early settlers that moved onto these bigger blocks with the Brook frontage came with the idea of fruit and vegetable growing, also running a few cows, some had pigs and poultry. Not many acres you may think some settlers bought two or three blocks and farmed them as one.

As I had been born at Muchea, a small mixed farming community, I had got to know quite a few of the settlers that lived in that particular spot at Gingin. I had a few years away from Muchea after I left school at a small wheatbelt place called Baandee. I stayed there for five years and came back to live in Gingin in 1934. I bought a small piece of land, 12 acres in all - one six-acre block on the Brook and three, two-acre blocks on the top side of the road on a 99-year lease.

The property I bought was developed by a

Mr F Wells, years later sold to Mr E A Benefield who used it for a market garden.

I will now give the names of the principal land owners situated in the "Police Paddock" and in later issues write something about them all and the part they played in the development of our town, their occupations and various little items of interest about these independent, industrious people.

Starting at the turn of the Brook when it entered the "Horseshoe" were the Misses Horan – Lily and Eileen and Mr Horan, Mr and Mrs Joe Riley, Mr and Mrs C G Riley, Mr and Mrs Hughy King, Mrs Butler and her son Bill, Mr and Mrs Alex Collett, then the property I had purchased from Mr Benefield. Then came Mr and Mrs Charlie Dewar, Mr and Mrs Paddy Butler, Mr and Mrs Bob Collett, Mr and Mrs Martin Mullins and son Ted, Mrs Riley (mother of Joe and Cyril), Mr and Mrs Dick Jones, Mr and Mrs Bill Cotterill, Mr and Mrs Alf Collett, Mrs Shaw, Mr and Mrs George Butler, Mr and Mrs Tom Hatch, Mr and Mrs Bill Anderson, Mr and Mrs Jack Hudson. Then at the turn of the road where the school is now were Mr and Mrs Pierce Herbert, Mrs Mortimer, Frank Hewston, Mr and Mrs Ralph Hill and Mr and Mrs Fred Hill. That gets me down to the Gingin Police Station.

passionate about? Aged care and youth. Keeping the aged in their own homes with the care they need. Our youth are our future and we need to provide them with opportunities to grow within the Shire.



# Vale Kenneth Keeffe 17/10/1936 - 15/03/2024


Ken passed away surrounded by family on the 15th of March.

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
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

#### Whitefly woes

In the intricate world of plant pests, whitefly, from the family Aleyrodidae, have a misleading name, given they are not files at all. Instead, they belong to the order Hemiptera, sharing kinship with other sap sucking insect pests like aphids, scale, and mealybugs.

In their juvenile form the nymphs bear a resemblance In their juvenile form the hymphs bear a resemblance to scale, while in their adult stage they take on the appearance of small moths. The only part of their name that is accurate, is the 'white'. This is particularly obvious when adult whitefiles are abruptly disturbed and take flight. The result is a large white plume or cloud of these tiny insects around their host plant. This behaviour is often referred to as 'flushing'.

#### **Biology and lifecycle**

Whiteflies are a tiny insect with a rapid and prolific lifecvcle. Females lav between 30 to 40 lifecycle. Females lay between 30 to 40 near-microscopic eggs on the underside of leaves. Upon hatching, the 0.3 mm nymphs actively seek a feeding spot. Once found, they stay put, feeding, and moulting until their final form reaches 1 mm. The nymph then transforms into a winged adult, approximately 1.5 to 2.5 mm in size, completing the lifecycle in about one month. In spring and autumn, this lifecycle may be completed in as little as 18 days for some species. Whiteflies are not fussy eaters and have a broad host range of horticultural plants including tropical fruits,

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wilting, curling, or distortion and check the underside of leaves for a sticky excretion (known as honeydew) or sooty mould. If found in the early stages, whiteflies can be reduced by removing infested leaves, hosing down with water, or even vacuuming (suitable for pot plants). If insecticides are needed, there are a range products available. If treating vegetables or fruit trees ensure you read the label and abide by any withholding periods. For most products, repeated treatments will be required, and remomber to nay. treatments will be required, and remember to pay special attention to the undersides of those leave

citrus, and solanaceous vegetables, plus many ornamental species, trees, and weeds. They are relatively weak flyers and rely on wind and human assistance for transportation, hitching rides on


assistance for transportation, nitroining rides on clothing, gardening equipment, and plant material. Three of five important species of whitefly in Western Australia were introduced this way. The other two, citrus whitefly and the native strain of *Bemisia tabaci*, are both native to Australia.

Like other sap sucking insect pests, feeding damage

Line outer say sucking insect pests, feeding damage caused by whitefly, in both its adult and nymph stages can result in cell or leaf death (necrosis), impacting plant growth. Certain whitefly species are also able to transmit plant viruses. Virus symptoms include irregular ripening in tomatoes and blanching in carrots and broccoil.

The key to effective whitefly management is early detection. Check the upper surface of leaves for sign of feeding damage such as yellow mottling, silvering, wilting, curling, or distortion and check the underside

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

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
