

Koorunga CWA

The affectionately known CWA of WA, is celebrating one hundred years of activity by women, who have been living, loving and working together in metropolitan, rural and remote communities. The organization is a wonderful tapestry of loyalty, care and resilience.

CWA has made a positive impact on so many lives. It has empowered women to getinvolved, to path a voice for policy change, to deliver an essential service and sometimes simply to offer a cuppa tea and a place to unwind.

Gingin CWA Branch offered this and so much more for over 50 years.

A brief history of the CWA Rest Rooms by Olive Fewster. The first branch was formed on 22nd December 1949 at a meeting held at the Granville Hostel at Gingin. Mrs Harriet Gordon kindly offered the use of a room in her house, for future meetings, until we were

able to build our own Rest Room, which we gladly accepted.

Our membership by the end of 1950 was thirty (30) and by that time we were anxious to build our own Rest Room. On 11th March 1954 the President and Secretary met with members of Parliament at the Shire Office to discuss the purchase of land. On the 10th of March 1955 we were told we could have a block of land next to the old schoolhouse in which Mrs Gordon lived. Later when Mrs Gordon decided to leave Gingin, she suggested we ask to change the block we had for the old schoolhouse, that she was leaving, to renovate for our building. After much discussion on all sides, an exchange was made to the Public Works Department of the block we had purchased to the school house block adjourning for One hundred Pound (\$200.00). The school house was built in 1889 for the local headmaster and the building was extended in 1902.

After our branch purchased the building and renovations complete the official opening took place 29th July 1959 and is known as The Harriet Gordon Rest Room. Fundraising was mostly from catering for weddings, dinners, cake stalls, tourist buses, sheep and cattle sales for afternoon tea. An annual ball was held yearly and a Flower Show in September. Many busy bees were held in those early days as the building was in badly need of attention. We often look back with amusement at the crude tools used and the many newspapers soaked in cement used to block the gaps where the walls didn't quite meet the ceiling in places, then plastered over the gaps. An extension was added to the rear of the building in 1992.

Koorunga CWA Branch, which meets alternatively between Gingin and Wannamal is celebrating their 42nd birthday with a lunch on Friday May 31st at the Mogumber Hub. A theme of "come dressed in something from 1982" is sure to create plenty of laughs. Past members and friends are welcome to attend.

The April meeting of the branch involved a fun and informative visit to Moore Clothes. As most members had not visited this Op Shop before, to learn about the donations and charities they support, indulge in some shopping and create plenty of laughter made for a great outing.

Hello Gingin Community,

The Gingin CRC located at 1a Lily King Place is a 'Startrack Care Agency'. Parcels are delivered to us via Startrack. Once received at our centre we have volunteers who sort the parcels and then phone the recipient to advise that they have a parcel to collect.

To ensure a smooth process and prompt receival of your parcels, we kindly request when you order anything to be delivered to Gingin that you include:

- •A Phone Number so that we can notify you that a parcel has arrived in our delivery room.
- •A Home or Business Address rather than a post office box number. This ensures that all parcels can be accurately delivered to you.
- •Do not use 1A Lily King Place:

We kindly request that you refrain from using 1A Lily King Place as your address. This address has caused confusion with parcels arriving from different transport companies, making it difficult for us to locate the intended recipient.

People have been using this address thinking that when ordering a parcel, the parcel will be delivered via Startrack. This is not the case as the supplier will use the courier that they choose.

Your cooperation in these matters is highly appreciated and will significantly contribute to improving parcel delivery within the Shire of Gingin.

Where Are They Now? - Richard Diggins

This is an occasional series about people who have lived in, or have been associated with Gingin or the broader Shire, of whom is asked the question "I wander where they are now, and what they are doing?"

In this month's edition of the Buzz the person in focus is Richard Diggins.

Richard's name is associated with a number of community projects particularly as the founding member and key driver of the Friends of Gingin Brook, which first met in 1997. Signage of the work done by this group can be found at the Three Bridges and the Jim Gordon Trail, but his contribution to the town can be found in many other community minded activities.

These include the peppercorn lease and restoration of the Railway Station building and associated Railway Reserve land for 21 years, the building of the boardwalk over the Jim Gordon Trail prior to which it was a dirt path that flooded in heavy rain along with the identification and signage indicating the names of the various native plants on this trail; and the involvement of the Gingin District High School students with the Friends of Gingin Brook in regeneration projects along the Brook banks and in the Railway Reserve land adjacent to the Railway Station.

Richard also became involved in the late 1990's as a part of the fund-raising team and spokesperson for St Lukes Church when the parishioners were required to raise \$100,000 for its restoration because rising damp, termites, and stone deterioration was threatening this social and religious landmark.

Firstly, a little about Richard. He was born in Victoria, chose banking as a career, and was transferred to Western Australia by Westpac (formerly the Bank of NSW) in 1969 as the bank's Public Relations Manager for Western Australia.

On arrival to Western Australia, he and his wife Pauline settled in Subiaco.

Richard was elected to the Subiaco Council in 1974 and four years later was elected Mayor a position from which he retired 11 years later in 1989, being the City's second longest serving Mayor.

Where Richard and Pauline are now in his words. 'Our time in Gingin began in 1987, triggered by a notice on the railway station front door which said, "Unless expressions of interest have been received by the Shire on or before the 30th June 1987 for the useful retention of the building, it would be demolished."

Following obtaining the lease from the Shire we proceed to restore the building and its surrounds, and with the involvement of community members established the "Friends of Gingin Brook".

The lease expired in mid-October 2007.

Gingin will always hold a special place in our families' memories.

The subsequent years have seen additions to family numbers with marriages and grandchildren, with one family now living in the USA.

We are now in our late 80's and still live in our heritage listed home in Subiaco.

These days we are still involved in several community activities. Pauline's primary interest is taking care of the Subiaco primary school gardens, and I am enjoying my 33rd year as Board Member of the Regal Theatre Foundation Limited, and currently serving as the Secretary/Treasurer of the Subiaco Shenton Park RSL Sub-Branch.'

Footnote: As a resident living opposite the Railway Station Reserve one of my memories of Richard and Pauline are them pushing a small 4 stroke lawnmower over the entire Railway Reserve from the Railway station to Roe Street so creating park like area for all to enjoy, visitors and residents alike, as they passed by.

Sadly, there is no signage at the Railway Station to indicate the work done by Pauline and Richard to save and renovate this Heritage listed building. Had they not offered to do so the Gingin Railway Station would have been demolished.

Past Gingin News

Continuing Mr Fewster's reminiscing of the Gingin Community.

Gingin News – August 1984 Issue No:21 The "Police Paddock" as remembered by Mr Norman Fewster [Continued from previous issue]

When I came to Gingin, Mr Horan was the Road Board Secretary on a Salary of about £3 per week. Daddy Horan as he was known to everybody, did all his Road Board work on the outside with his horse and sulky. A fiery old man, always known for his quick temper, but a fair and dedicated man to his job. It took a very bright boy to put one over him.

When he passed away, his daughter Lily took over the job as Secretary of the Road Board. Her sister Eileen ran a few milking cows, plus quite a nice orange orchard and a number of poultry. In the years that Lily was Secretary, she was a person that gave everything to her job. She was always ready to give a helping hand to anyone in need and a great arbitrator and peace maker. Many a time she had to stand between two irate Ratepayers, sort out their differences and send them away on good terms and also still good neighbours.

When carrying out the duties of Road Board Secretary, she always insisted that it was only a part time job, and would never take any regular holidays, only a few odd days during the year. She passed away in the old Road Board office, found lying on the floor near the desk she had worked at so diligently for many years and only the day before the Auditors were due to check her books. They had no worries as everything was in complete order such was the manner in which she worked.

Lily's death was a great blow to her sister Eileen, who carried on the farm for many years after. When in her early seventies, she had a stroke and had to be taken to Mt Henry Home and passed away in March of this year, well into her eighties.

The Horan's neighbours were the Riley brothers, Cyril and Joe. Their mother, known to a lot of the old hands a Grandma Riley lived on a small block in a very old mud brick house on the toe of the horseshoe. I can just remember her when she went riding the old-fashioned way on her side saddle. She lived to a great age her husband who had been a schoolteacher had passed on many years before.

The two Riley brothers carried on a storekeeping business. Cyril's first shop was in an old-fashioned mud brick place opposite the old Granville. The building still remains and was lived in until quite recently.

Brother Joe, at that time was working up on a Station in the North, however, in later years, both brothers owned and ran the shop near the bridge, now known as Lucrafts. Joe's main interest was in horse racing. He always owned and raced a good horse mainly on country tracks. At that time Gingin boasted a racetrack and many a good story could be written about Great Race Days. The neighbouring small communities of Bindoon and Muchea also had their Race Meetings, but more about that later.

Joe and his wife and family of four lived most of their lives in Gingin - they were a great family. Joe has since passed on and his wife moved to Morley. She had many sorrows which she bore with great courage and strength. After losing her eldest daughter and son, then her daughter-in-law, she was left to raise her three grandchildren, of which she can be justly proud.

Cyril Riley was completely different to his other brother, and I will now add, that in my opinion, no man did more for the town of Gingin than Cyril Riley. Married with four children, he was in the shop business most of his life.

A man of many interests, he was very active in promoting the old town of Gingin. He had many talents and a great worker for the

Methodist Church, sometimes even taking the services.

As Cyril was a great comedian and had the gift of being able to recite poetry, he was one of the main instigators of the very many concerts that used to be held at that time. Apart from the Silent Picture Shows that came to town, we had to provide our own entertainment. Card parties, social evenings, community concerts etc were always being organised.

Cyril was always busy on all town committees and Secretary of many. I remember in the 1920's he used to have Electric Culture demonstrations near his house (it was a scheme to grow vegetables with electricity). Later he generated our first electric power from a small powerhouse behind his shop what a boon that was for Gingin. We hung up the old kerosene lamps that were lit every evening on street corners and at the bridge by a very old man a pioneer of Gingin, Mr Fred Hill.

Eventually, Cyril Riley took over the daily Gingin to Perth bus run which he ran for many years. This service was commenced in 1928 by Mr Fred Mitchum (what a great scout Fred was!) and what a great daily service he provided for Gingin and other small places on the way to Perth. Cyril carried on the service until most of the residents of Gingin bought their own cars and went to the city under their own steam. It was a bad day when this service ceased.

As the years went by, Cyril leased the shop and retired to a new home on Mooliabeenee Road. He later moved to the city as his heath began to fail, and just recently he passed away. Many people will remember Cyril for his dedication and love for his old hometown.

When I first settled in Gingin around the Police Paddock, his grocery cart would call at our home, piled up with all the Grocery orders, as well as the Mail (he collected from the post office), bread form the Bakers and the papers. All our goods were delivered at the door. Tom McCormack the butcher would make his meat deliveries on Tuesdays and 19

Saturdays with the greengrocer Mr Harold Cockram doing likewise with his fruit and vegetables.

I would say the Gingin Methodist Church was the greatest loser when Mr C G Riley moved to Perth. In the early days of this town, the Methodist Church ran a two-day Exhibition which consisted of flowers, vegetables and other farm grown produce in the form of jam, pickles, eggs, butter etc as well as hay, cloves and the like. It had its stalls of various kinds and sports events would also be held. Dinners and teas would be served, and I think it was the social event of the year. It was a great get together for the whole of the Gingin district and Cyril was, I feel the key organiser.

Later on in the winter months, the Methodist Church ran their Tea Meeting. This was a high tea, about 5 p.m. followed by a local Grand Concert and again Mr Riley, in my opinion was the main actor and producer.

He was the Secretary of the Methodist Church Trust for as many years as I can remember (about 50) but owing to failing eyesight, he had to resign about 1972.

Cyril was also the local J.P. and sat on many hearings. He did a lot of bookkeeping for farmers, filling in Income Tax forms and various other Clerical work, seeming always ready and available to help any person in need of advice, or such things as transport to hospital, doctor or otherwise. Yes, truly a busy, full life and his passing was mourned by many.
