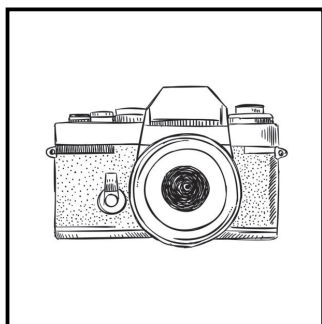

Front Page - Nikki Wins!!

Nikki was recently named Western Australia's State Winner in the prestigious Resilient Australia Awards, which celebrate those who help communities prepare for, respond to, and recover from disasters. Her powerful photograph, *We Work Together as One*, captured during a multi-agency emergency response, earned top honours for its depiction of teamwork between firefighters, police, paramedics, and the RAC Rescue Helicopter. She will now represent WA in the People's Choice category at the national awards in Canberra later this year.

For over 17 years, Nikki has been a member of the Gingin Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service guiding her crew through emergencies with courage and compassion. Now, her leadership and commitment have been recognised across the state.

Nikki recently took part in the Step Up for MSWA challenge alongside her VFRS team, climbing Perth's Bell Tower to raise funds for those living with neurological conditions. She also leads regular training sessions for new fire and rescue volunteers and participates in planned burn-offs to help safeguard the local area.

Beyond the fire ground, Nikki continues to give back in many ways. She is a local councillor, a photographer who documents life and events across the region, always on hand at Roxanne's Dance Workshop, and the Shire Representative on the Gingin District High School Board.

Through it all, she remains grounded in her most important roles, being a proud wife, mother and grandmother.

Nikki Woods doesn't seek the spotlight, but her actions have long spoken volumes. Her recognition is a reflection of the deep impact she's made in Gingin and beyond, through service, leadership, and a steadfast commitment to others.

Gingin Brook Catchment Group

Water quality in the Gingin Brook 2024 part 3

Monitoring was undertaken at seven sites in the Gingin Brook catchment in winter/spring 2024. Three sites were on the Gingin Brook (Edgar St, Three Bridges and Neergabby Old Bridge) and one on each of Moondah Brook, Mungala Brook, Red Gully Creek and Quin Brook. Parameters measured at each site were pH, salinity, total suspended solids, nitrogen and phosphorus. In addition, the Three Bridges site was tested for heavy metals and hydrocarbons, as water ways within town sites are at risk of contamination by these chemicals. The monitoring of all these parameters will provide a baseline against which future monitoring can be compared. Results were presented at the Gingin Brook Catchment Group AGM in April.

Heavy metals and hydrocarbon results were reported in this column in the May edition and physical findings (pH, salinity and total suspended solids) in the June edition. Nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus) are reported here.

Nitrogen levels exceeded the ANZECC trigger value on all occasions at all four eastern sites and on at least one occasion in each of the western sites.

The trigger value for phosphorus was exceeded at every sampling run at the Three Bridges site and on at least one occasion at all other sites, except Red Gully where phosphorus levels were well below trigger value on each run. West Australian soils are low in phosphorus so phosphorus fertilisers are widely used in agriculture and for lawns and gardens.

Nutrients in waterways are detrimental to aquatic flora and fauna and to people and animals using the water. High nutrient levels, particularly nitrates, are a direct health hazard when they occur in drinking water. Algae which are naturally present in water will take up the nutrients and, if other factors such as temperature and light are favourable, grow very rapidly causing an algal bloom. In Australia algal blooms most often are caused by blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) and generally occur in warmer weather in still or slow-moving water. Some of these blooms are toxic to humans and animals, resulting in the water being unsuitable to drink and limiting its use for recreation.

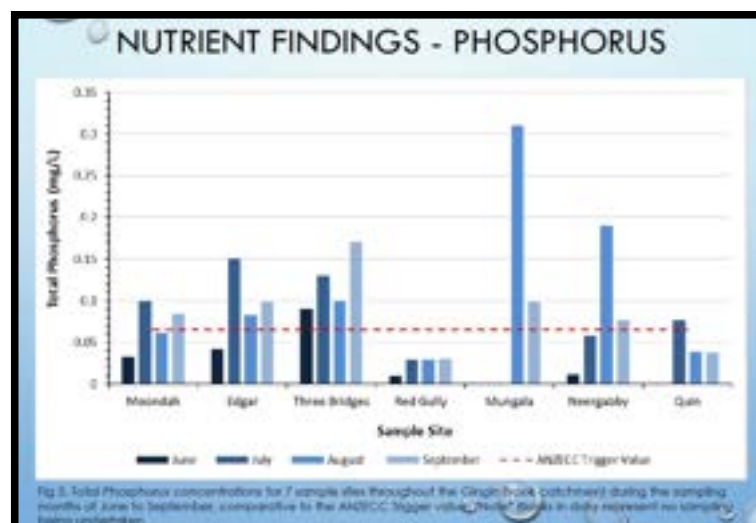
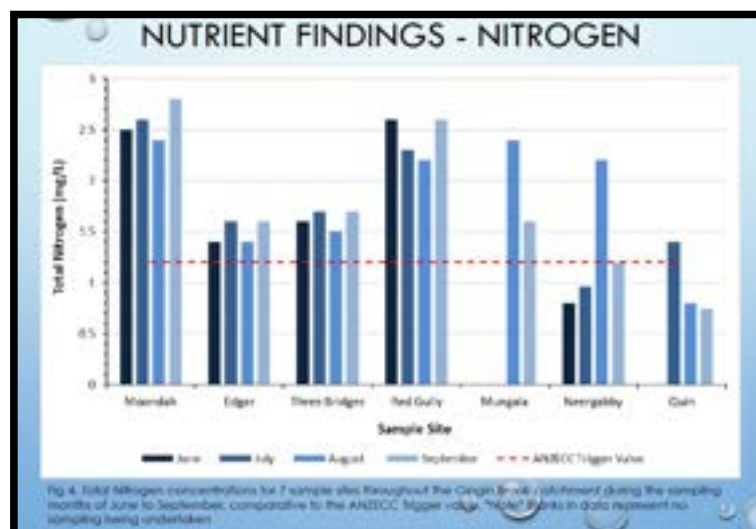
Even if the bloom is not toxic it can result in low oxygen levels in the water at night when algae are using oxygen during respiration. During the day when the algae are producing oxygen during photosynthesis this is not a problem, until conditions become unsuitable for the algae and they die. When this happens, the dead algae start rotting and the water may become smelly. The bacteria feeding on the debris use oxygen during the day as well as at night so oxygen levels are always low. Low oxygen causes stress or even death of animals living in the water. It is when oxygen levels become constantly low following the crash of a bloom, that mass fish deaths are seen.

Rapidly increasing growth of other aquatic plants can also occur, with an imbalance in the ecosystem resulting. Waterways may become choked, limiting recreational use of waterways by humans and the normal movement of aquatic animals. Pumps and pipes used to access water or allow it to flow freely will also be affected. The increased shading of water can result in submerged native plants being shaded out and the usual activities of aquatic animals being disrupted.

Nutrients in water bodies come from a variety of sources. Rainfall running off land will carry soil and organic matter, including manure from farmland, and fertiliser from farms, horticulture and urban lawns and gardens into waterways and wetlands. This is called a diffuse source

as the nutrients come from a wide area. Point sources include waste water released from an industrial site or sewage plant, or leaching from rubbish tips, holding ponds, stockpiles or spills. These can have high nutrient levels and leached nutrients may travel by subsurface water flow to waterways making the source more difficult to locate.

A second water quality monitoring season is underway. The first run undertaken in June saw flow at all but one site (Mungala) this year. Mungala and also Quin were dry in June last year. Edgar as well as Three Bridges will be monitored for metals this year.



Pest Alerts

Locals are reminded to be aware of the restrictions on moving wood or plants out of the metropolitan area due to the Polyphagous Shothole Borer infestation. The infestation is now deemed not able to be eradicated so movement restrictions will remain in place indefinitely to restrict the spread of the pest as

much as possible. The adult stage of the borer can fly but only for short distances. Movement of infested wood or plants from infested to uninfested areas provides a means of spreading the infestation widely and rapidly to new areas, potentially resulting in the devastation seen in the metro area arriving in our beautiful area.

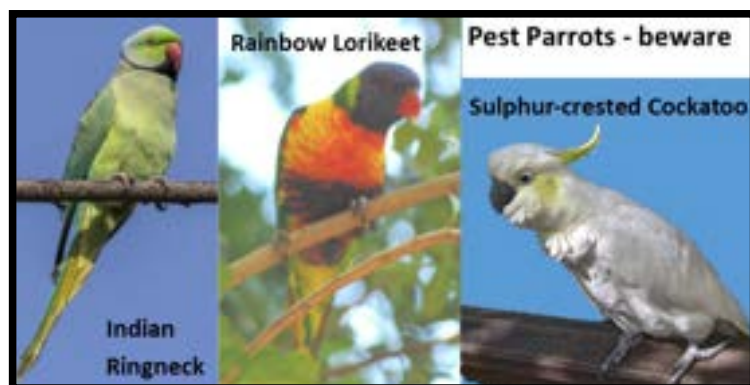


If you suspect an infestation in your local area, please report it to MyPestGuide via the MyPestGuide Reporter app on your smart phone or the webpage <https://mypestguide.dpird.wa.gov.au/reporter/#/>. You can also report to Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS) via email padis@dpird.wa.gov.au or phone 08 9368 30380. Photos, including something as an indicator of size, (e.g. ruler or coin) of holes and tunnels or other symptoms as well as location and date should be included.

DPIRD is also requesting sightings of Rainbow Lorikeets outside the metro area (Chittering and Gingin Shire or north) be reported. There is a program in place to keep these destructive pests restricted to the metro area. They displace native bird species and cause a lot of damage to horticultural crops.

There is one Sulphur Crested Cockatoo (also a pest species with a control program in place) known to be in Muchea and reports of sightings of that bird are also keenly sought. Note: there are other white cockatoo species commonly seen in Muchea so report only if you are able to see a yellow crest on the head. Please also report Sulphur Crested Cockatoos if seen in other areas – again look for the yellow crest as other white cockatoos are present locally.

Report sightings as above for PSHB. Photos are great if you are able to get one but if not report location, date and time and provide a description and a comment as to your confidence in the identification.

Western Power - Generator Hire or Purchase Contribution Program

Have you been affected by planned power outages? Western Power's Generator Hire or Purchase Contribution Program could help reduce the impact on your operations.

Western Power may reimburse certain costs incurred by eligible business applicants for the hire or purchase of a generator to be used during planned power outages. The maximum amount that Western Power will reimburse an eligible applicant is \$1,000 (including GST).

- For business use only (not residential)
- Valid for one planned outage only
- Electricity use must be under 160MWh/year
- Subject to Western Power's approval

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It's Art you Philistine! by Alan Gent

Success! Raymond Newbury relaxed on the banana lounge by his pool and listened to his lovely wife, Celeste, 'busy' in the kitchen supervising his four-year-old daughter Rachel, 'cooking'. Rachel looked very much like her mother, with honey-blond hair and a rare impish grin. Her eyes were definitely from her father though. She'd inherited his intense gaze and the bluey-green irises. When Raymond painted, she also liked to paint, getting the little set of brushes out and the other requirements that he'd given her, as most parents do when their children look as though they're showing an interest. It goes without saying that her 'paintings' would take pride of place on the fridge door for all to see and gaze at in apparent awe when they came to visit.

As a successful abstract artist, Raymond, still in his thirties, had managed to tap in to a 'niche market' attracting a certain type of person that liked to decorate their plush homes with art that was beautiful and enigmatic. The beauty came from the nebulous nature of the colouring and stunning visual effect, most often defying explanation. It didn't stop people trying though, and quite often fierce arguments among his critics and proponents had raged in the print media and online.

Unfortunately, Raymond, like most human beings, and despite his wealth and apparent success, was not satisfied with his lot. He yearned for that one picture that really 'hit the headlines'. A picture, like Pollock's 'Blue Poles' that would stir people up so much that it would be remembered for decades.

Raymond had tried really hard with his painting for the next exhibition at the Town Hall at the end of the month. When her father finally emerged, she would seek his approval, and, following his example would insist that it needed to be signed at the bottom – just like her Dad's. He would dutifully hold her little hand and help her sign "R.N." on the bottom right hand corner, just as Rachel had seen her Dad do. The last painting the little girl completed was a front view of their house, with windows painted on each corner and the three members of the family seeming to be floating in mid-air. "That's wonderful", said Raymond. It's the best painting you've ever done". Rachel beamed. Praise from her father made her feel like a Queen!

The day before the showing, all the paintings to be displayed had to be packed up and moved into town. This would normally go like clockwork, but on this occasion, Raymond couldn't be there to supervise, having received a call from a TV station for an interview. He selected two of his sketches and two of his older paintings as an example of his work. Many of his paintings were unframed, and it was two of these that he decided to take.

Later the same morning, after he had left to record the interview for showing on the evening news - "free advertising", thought Raymond – the team of packers, supervised by Raymond's Manager, came to take his paintings away. Celeste had a list from Raymond, and they knew

exactly which of his paintings to take. Little Rachel would flit from one room to the other, making sure that the men in the overalls didn't damage any of her father's paintings.

The normal procedure for Raymond was to turn up at the Gallery at the Town Hall some hours before the start of the exhibition, to make sure all was in order, and that the paintings had been displayed by his Manager in the right places. On this occasion, though, the traffic was quite heavy. Raymond wasn't concentrating for that one important instant, and his car careered into the side of another vehicle. What made it worse, was that the 'other vehicle' happened to be a police car. When Raymond got out, water was pouring from the radiator on his car, and two very irate police constables were already taking notes. The resulting interview at the police station, the arrangement for the car to be towed and all the other inconveniences of a car accident took several hours to complete before poor Raymond was able to hire a taxi and get himself over to the Town Hall.

His mouth fell open. "But it....it's painted by a little child!" he exclaimed.

A number of people turned round and looked at him with obvious disapproval. A well-dressed gentleman looked him up and down disdainfully and said:

"It's ART, you Philistine!"

Norma’s Patch aka The Community Garden: Adopt a Bed

In 2022-2023 Norma Gray, along with a local resident, set about rejuvenating the Community Garden beds behind the Community Resource Centre, as they had become somewhat over run and in need of tender loving care.

A remarkable footnote to this tale is that Norma was at the commencement of this initiative ninety eight (98) years young, and as reported in a previous edition of the Buzz, you did not want to get between Norma, her pitch fork and a good piece of dirt !!

Weed, dig and plant were all part of Normas repertoire, following which she planted beans,

peas, potatoes, radishes and an array of leafy greens with some help, all of which yielded good harvests.

Norma passed away on June 27 2024 having reached her Centenary, and having the satisfaction of being part of harvesting the first crop of vegetables she had sown.

Niece in law Colleen Harris was keen that Norma’s efforts and her love of gardening and the growing of vegetables would continue in the Community Garden. She approached a few people who knew Norma to help her with this effort, and in agreement with the CRC Management Team the raised beds

continued on with the name of Norma's Patch (a sign being made by the Men's Shed); and the raised beds were once again dug out, fertilized and replanted in July last year.

Again there were bumper crops, and bunches of leafy greens were left as "freebies" at the counters of Treasure Trove and the CRC for anyone to take.

Corn, tomatoes and beans were planted at the end of last year but the long hot summer was too severe and there was little yield. It was therefore decided, until the cooler weather and rain had arrived, the seven beds would be left dormant. (One bed is occupied by a fruit tree and not in use)

That time has now arrived, but the merry band of 4 volunteers has been somewhat depleted due to circumstance, and it has been proposed an Adopt a Bed be trialled.

The plan, one or two people adopt one of the raised beds and grows whatever she or he may wish to grow in that bed, with the proviso it is a vegetable(s). The volunteer provides gloves, work tools and seedlings/seeds, although there could be a limited donation of these.

Of course the grower would expect part of the harvest, but must remember this is a Community Garden and would in all likelihood be sharing some of their crop with "passers by", and that could include some bugs and snails as no pesticides are to be used in the beds.

Colleen, Kerry and Mary will be continuing on with Norma's good work and will be "re-adopting" two of the beds.

However there are 5 others awaiting a "volunteer". The beds are approximately 2 metres x1.2 metres in size.

Consider it an opportunity to learn if you have a "green thumb", should you have never gardened before!!

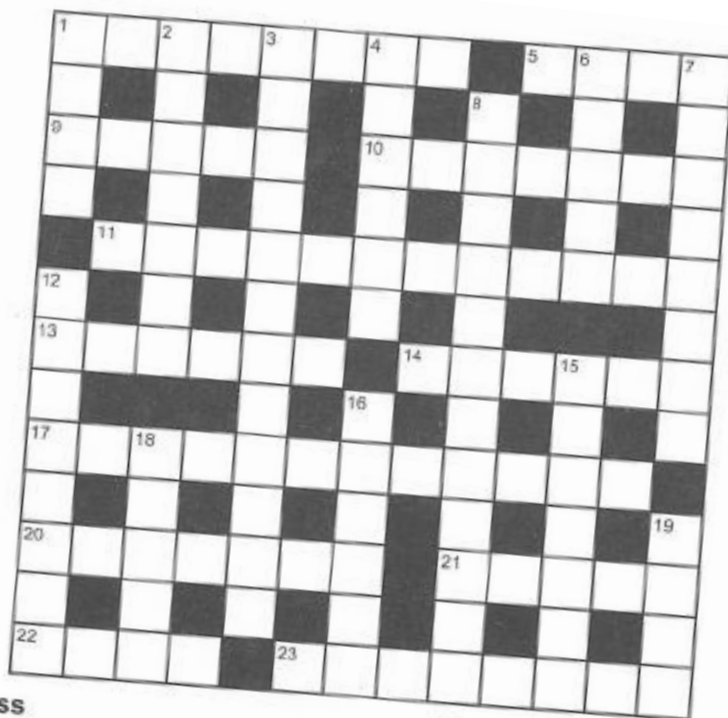

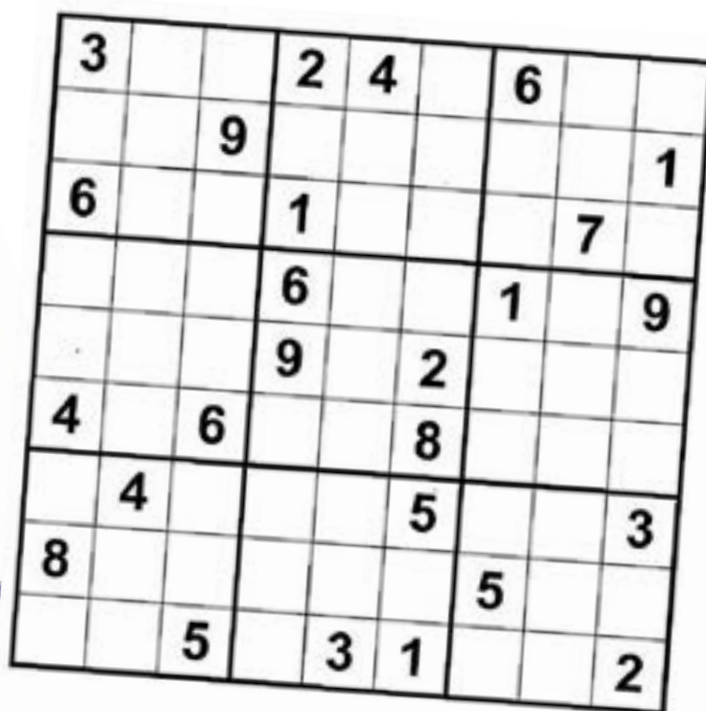

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Aged Care

From 1 July 2025, Support at Home will replace the existing Home Care Packages Program and Short-Term Restorative Care (STRC) Programme. The aim of this reform is to help older people live independently at home for longer. But with the New changes, comes more expenses.

From 1 July 2025, the super guarantee, that is - the percentage of your wage that your employer is required to pay into your super account, will increase from 11.5% to 12.0%, putting more away for your retirement.

Age Pension

Income and assets tests are updated three times a year. The upper limits (which determine if someone is disqualified) change on 20 March and 20 September, based on inflation (CPI).
